#### **Dolphin Oasis**

Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park was excited to inaugurate its highly anticipated Dolphin Oasis during a momentous ribbon-cutting ceremony on March 8, 2024. The event marked a significant milestone for the renowned marine park and the region's



attractions, drawing esteemed guests including local dignitaries, politicians and business leaders.

Spanning 2.2 acres of sandy dunes and palms along the picturesque emerald waters of the Florida Gulf Coast, Dolphin Oasis reflects Gulfarium's commitment to animal welfare, conservation education and visitor experience. With a \$30 million investment, the ex-

pansion comprises three large interconnected habitats and three husbandry habitats, totaling over one million gallons of Gulf saltwater. The immersive, natural-themed experience embodies the beauty of the Emerald Coast.

Though most of us as residents of these beautiful coastal communities realize we have a large military population across our immediate five county area (which serves as home to numerous military families from every U.S. military branch), what we may not often consider is the hardships and trying times that many of these men, women and families go through—financially and otherwise—both during their time of service and especially when transitioning into civilian life afterward.

I spoke with Tiffany Orner, Military Engagement Manager of Forever Warriors, as well as Greg Lambert, the organization's Logistics Support Leader, to find out a little more about what makes this foundation tick and just how determined they both are to find and provide the help necessary for the men,



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women and families they serve.

Tiffany is passionate about the organization's pillars. Transition, sustainment, mental health and community immersion are the reason Forever Warriors was born—brought into existence to fill a need to lighten these burdens and circumvent the stigma that often surrounds a military family having to seek help. "As an organization, Forever Warriors realizes that our military heroes often face post service challenges in obtaining the necessary requirements to transition into the civilian workforce," Tiffany said.

Tiffany says she felt a calling to make a difference for others because of her personal experience coming out of her past military service. "I had a ridiculously tough time, both during and after my service to our country. I am determined to ensure no service member ever feels the way I did. I am thankful for the opportunity to be the change that's so desperately needed in our local military community. I won't stop until EVERY veteran wants for nothing; and that starts with supporting those still serving in America's military," she said.

Forever Warriors works to multiply the awareness of the number of current community-based and military programs in place for this segment and to make navigating the road to help much more efficient. Additionally, Tiffany and Greg talked about the importance of making members of our coastal community more aware of deficits in the aide this segment of our population might need. All in



hopes of uniting to create new ways to best help this ever-growing group of Northwest Florida Gulf Coast families. "Less than 1% of Americans serve in the military. We have to set the standard and have each other's backs. We are Vets helping our brothers and sisters that have and continue to serve," said Greg.

Through their connection and close-knit work alongside other local, state and federal agencies, Tiffany, Greg and the volunteers and partner companies of Forever Warriors are often able to help secure resources from companies and private stakeholders, that are driven and dedicated to serving those who have served our country. In many instances these are companies who are owned or managed by prior service members; thus they see and understand the need they are helping to fill.

By bridging this gap to ci-

vilian life and introducing this population of our neighbors to resources and opportunities, Forever Warriors makes it possible for these families to experience a faster, smoother and less burdened transition to the world many of us live in yet take for granted.

# Phased Improvements Suggested For Fairgrounds

#### **Background**

The Okaloosa County Fairgrounds, located behind the Courthouse on Lewis Turner Boulevard, was originally owned and operated the City of Fort Walton Beach. In 2022, The Fort Walton Beach City Council declared it as surplus. Realizing that the land could be sold for real estate development, the Okaloosa Board of County Commissioners (BCC) entered into negotiations to purchase the valuable parcel of public land. The BCC realized that, in addition to annual events such as gun shows, the Okaloosa Fair, Antique shows and Fish Fries for All Sports, to name a few, the county will have a continuing need for a staging area when natural disasters, such as hurricanes, occur. This space would continue to be available to provide for power trucks and to house the National Guard. As a result of these discussions with the city, Okaloosa County agreed to purchase the Fairgrounds "as is" for \$4.1 million with the understanding that the county would have greater resources to update and modernize the facilities, especially with access to Tourist Development dollars available through the bed tax on short-term rentals. The idea is to keep as much green space as possible for such a need.

#### **Improvements**

After the purchase of the property, there seemed to be broad consensus by the Okaloosa County BCC that the existing dilapidated structures need to be improved. A citizen committee was appointed, with one appointment by each commissioner, with the goal to develop specific recommendations for improvements to the Fairgrounds. Note: All improvements will be paid for from Tourism Development dollars. No money will be used from Ad Valorem tax dollars. The BCC will have the final vote on any improvements.

#### **Committee Report**

The Citizen Committee began meeting in September 2023, with an initial tour of the facilities. Deficiencies were noted. Event history was considered as well as possible future events after completion of much-needed improvements. I want to thank the Citizens Committee, who



served without compensation, for their many selfless hours of work on this project.

The suggested plan to improve the current site would be implemented in phases. Detailed below are the specific improvements suggested by the Citizen Committee. Although there is a general consensus as to the vast majority of the suggested improvements, I have outlined below in red several significant additions. Because this is such an important capital project for the county that would affect all residents, I need your input specifically as to the major additions outlined in **bold**.

## **General Improvements Suggested:**

- Demolish the oldest and most dilapidated buildings;
- Remove trash and debris throughout the site and cleanup

overgrown vegetation;

- Remove the storage of unused and unnecessary equipment from the site;
- Relocate remaining storage items to outer remote buildings;
- Develop sections of **paved** and grass parking over time; and
- Work to ensure electricity and storm water issues are up to date and working.

#### **Existing Building Space**

- Ensure all roofs are weather tight with no leaks;
- Construct a new, attractive, uniform facade on outer existing buildings;
- Add new entrances at strategic points and demo existing entrances;
- Improve existing bathrooms:
- Add an 8-ft. covered walkway along the front of the existing buildings;
- Address parking needs and improve landscaping;
- Redo the 60-ft. area between Bldg. B and Bldg. C and the space between Bldg. D and Bldg. H by constructing a new addition that will include caterer's kitchen and bathroom that could serve both buildings;
- Explore improving the internal lighting, wall and floor finishing, painting and similar cosmetic improvements for each space:
- Redevelop the functional event spaces with HVAC, insulation, floors, lighting and wall finishes; and
- Allow for longer corridor space into a more finished homogenous space capable of being used as one space or divided for each of the Building B, C, D and H.

#### Open Space Area Behind Buildings

- Eliminate safety holes in the open space area and remove antiquated infrastructure;
- Relocate current RV spaces elsewhere on site, perhaps to the periphery, and build new side with correct infrastructure, adjusting any necessary Eglin agreements;

- Build oversized bathroom for the field/outside use events;
- Reconstruct the area with new underground infrastructure that can be utilized when needed and hidden when not needed;
- Add landscaping and turf to improve the overall appearance.

### New Large Multi-Purpose Building

- Construct a new minimum 30,000-sq.-ft. building on the east side of the existing building with approximately 10,000-sq.-ft of additional support space, e.g. bathrooms, kitchen, storage, mechanical, etc.:
- Build other new or replacement sections and parking over time as demand is determined and funding permits, as shown in the conventional plan;
- Ensure the new building is modern and multi-purpose with technology, high ceilings, sprinklers, etc. with the ability to function alone or together with the other venue spaces as part of a bigger event;
- Build other wing in Phase V over time.
- Estimates of cost for these improvements are north of \$10 million dollars.

#### **Commission Decision:**

The BCC approved Phase I of a comprehensive plan in March to refurbish the existing buildings with a new façade, kitchens and bathrooms. Other phases will be addressed as needed. The Fairgrounds are a wonderful county asset that will serve the community well for years to come: Emergency staging area when needed by power trucks and National Guard; Nice event venue—an alternative to expensive venues such as the Destin-FWB Conference Center on Okaloosa Island.

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## **Sharing & Caring Needs Your Help**

An anonymous Fort Walton Beach donor has presented a challenge to Sharing & Caring Fort Walton Beach to raise \$25,000 by Nov. 1, 2024. If 25,000 is raised, it will be matched with a \$25000 donation—a total of \$50,000 for this valuable organization!

"Inflation has been a challenge the last two to three years and we very much need help in securing this matching gift," says board member Al Hudson. Donation Checks can be mailed or dropped off at 126 Eglin Parkway, Fort Walton Beach, 32548.

Al says the following are factors have caused the non-profit organization to need help:

- A food-cost increase of approximately 20% over the past three years;
- Increase in larger-size families;
  - Increase in cost of other ex-

penses (insurance, utilities, personal care items, etc.);

• Helped feed more than 15,000 clients last year.

In September of 2023, Sharing & Caring Fort Walton Beach completed a 900-sq.-ft. building expansion more than doubling its food pantry space. The increased pantry space allowed the organization to buy more food in bulk, making donated dollars go further.

First opening its doors in 1985, Sharing & Caring was originally based in a building donated by the First Baptist Church of Fort Walton Beach, but relocated to its present location in 1992. The current building, leased from First Presbyterian Church, was renovated extensively by volunteer labor and generous donations from the community.

For decades, Sharing & Caring has served as an emergency food source for qualifying



clients, also providing personal care items and vouchers for prescription medications based on income. The facility's food bank is available to anyone who resides between Hurlburt Field in the west, Destin in the East and Eglin Air Force Base to the north. Its clients include families, children, seniors, the homeless and those who are unemployed. It's estimated the pantry serves roughly 30 families a day and more than 15,000 clients per year. More than half of the pantry's food provided comes from community donations, local churches and businesses. The rest is purchased by Sharing and Caring using financial donations.

Currently, the facility is staffed by approximately 50 volunteers who operate the offices and food pantry Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. For those interested in helping out, Sharing & Caring volunteers are available during business hours to accept your monetary donation as well as food and personal care items. Tax-deductible monetary donations can also be made on the organization's website: https:// www.sharing-n-caring.org. "We are always looking for volunteers to help staff the office and food pantry also," says Al. 

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## Will Billy Bowlegs Gain A Foothold Along Our Sands?

68th Annual Billy Bowlegs Festival I May 16-20

Ahoy, maties! Avast, ye! It's time to open your treasure chest, get your eyepatch on, take out your sword and get your pirate gear ready for 2024's 68th Annual Billy Bowlegs Pirate Festival—May 16-20. Any landlubber knows Pirate Captain Billy Bowlegs has been setting his sights on our sandy white shores since the 1950s!

On Saturday afternoon, May 18th, Captain Billy will return with the entire Krewe of Bowlegs and his allies from visiting Krewes across the country, after his defeat the night prior. The mayor will try everything to stop him from landing. Will he be a match for the overwhelming presence of Captain Billy's pirates? Will the Captain prevail in taking over our city? The pirates and wenches will be full of merriment and mischief as they hand out treasures (3:30-4 p.m.). Festivities at the Landing throughout the day include live music (noon-6 p.m.), an



arts and crafts festival (10 a.m.), along with food, beverages and other vendor booths.

Finally, on Monday night, May 20th, the Torchlight Parade will start at 7 p.m. on Eglin Pkwy. from First Street to Hughes Avenue to conclude the festival. The parade will be anchored by Captain Billy, the entire Krewe of Bowlegs and more than 100 floats and participants





With 500 members, it means that a \$100,000 grant can be given to five non-profit organizations that will multiply the health of the community it serves in ways that will have generational impact. As Joni points out, "You could certainly write a check for \$1000 and give it to a non-profit who would certainly appreciate it and use it. But when you give \$100,000 as a collective gift, that is what takes a nonprofit to the

next level. It's transformational, no matter how transformational is defined. \$100,000 is a big investment."

The local chapter started in 2012 with 12 women from both Okaloosa and Walton counties. They dreamed about the changes that could happen when this level of generosity is given to local nonprofits and decided they wanted to be part of this international movement. Its mission: To be a collective force for good; uniting and empowering women to give together, creating transformational impact, locally and globally.

One such recipient in 2023 was the EOD Warrior Foundation under the Health and Wellness category. They strive to support the quality of life and reduce the challenges that come from volunteering to take on one of the most dangerous jobs in the military, the safe disarming and disposal of bombs and other explosives. EODWF recognizes that members of the Special Forces have the highest rate of suicide and mental health struggles that can lead to phys-



ical and familial instability. The grant from Impact100 NWF allowed them to expand their care by directly affecting two critical parts: Updating and renovating the EODWF building and expanding existing support as well as creating new programmatic support.

It's not just locally started non-profits who benefit. Even more well-known international organizations who want to serve locally, such as The Salvation Army, applied to Impact100 under the "Family" category. With its grant, The Salvation Army

bought a disaster response vehicle and went to Northern Florida after Hurricane Idalia, serving 500 meals per sitting. The truck was equipped with Starlink, and it gave those who were affected a chance to reach out to family, offering some peace of mind during a devastating time. The truck doesn't just operate during natural disasters. Every week, the truck goes to Crestview on Tuesdays to feed the hungry, a day when meals aren't so readily available.

Both of these programs would have been impossible to

grow with a single \$1000 donation, and it would have delayed critical services as funds were gathered. However, with 100 people linking arms in each of these categories, members of our military and those who face food insecurity are already feeling the benefits of these grants.

Impact 100 is also designed to vet those who are seeking a grant to ensure the money is used as outlined in the proposal. "Any organization has to be a 501c3 for at least two years upon appli-

cation. So, there's some financial history that can be reviewed. We also need them to be registered with the Florida Department of Agriculture which provides the license to solicit contributions. They also have to be registered with the Florida Division of Corporations and file their reports regularly with SunBiz. We also ask that they have directors' and officers' insurance as well as general liability. We don't want to fund someone who could get sued and then lose it. If it's a religious organization, they can't require that recipients of their

services prescribe to their particular faith even if they identify to one in particular. Forcing that would disqualify them from applying for our grant. Same with mandatory political affiliation."

If you are an organization ready to make a massive headway for the people you serve, then note that the Letter of Intent deadline is May 15, 2024, and the application deadline is July 15, 2024. Interested non-profits must submit the letter of intent and meet those qualifications before being given the grant application.

How does membership work for those who want to be part of Impact100 NWF? "Many of our members will write a check and that is the extent of their involvement. That contribution, however, allows them a vote for the organization they want to offer a grant to. For those who want to get more involved, there are committees under each category and it's those people who will have a more intimate knowledge of each applicant as they get to know the founders and tour facilities.

"We want members to be able to participate in the nonprofits and activities where they want to see change. Many women join us because they want to make a difference in specific areas like education or environmental preservation. The reason we are promoting membership is each person has one vote for every \$100,000 that's available. This means if we don't have the full amount in each category, members have to vote for the categories they feel most passionate about. With less money available, critical areas will go unserved. Last year we only had four grants to give, so members had to choose the four categories that they wanted to vote in. This is why five grants is so important. We want every category to have a chance to grow."


With all 500 membership slots filled, exponential good could be injected into Okaloo-

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## Lionfish Festival: A Dive into Conservation Efforts

The Emerald Coast is not just a picturesque backdrop for tourists; it is also a battleground against an invasive species - the lionfish. On May 18-19, 2024, the Lionfish Festival returns to Fort Walton Beach, rallying the community in an ongoing effort to combat this threat to the local marine ecosystem.

First, what is a lionfish? Lionfish, with their striking red and white stripes, are not native to the waters of northwest Florida. Originating from the Indo-Pacific region, they were introduced to the Atlantic Ocean and have since become a formidable invasive species. Their rapid reproduction rate and lack of natural predators have led to a surge in population, wreaking havoc on native fish populations and coral reefs.

The Lionfish Festival is more than just a celebration; it's a call to action. It aims to raise awareness about the detrimental effects of lionfish on the marine environment and promote sustainable solutions. One such solution is lionfish removal through fishing derbies and dives, which are central to the festival's activities.

In 2023, 144 divers in Destin and Fort Walton Beach captured over 24,000 lionfish during the Emerald Coast Open tournament, demonstrating the community's commitment to conservation efforts. This year's pre-tournament is already underway lasting through May 16, and sets the stage for two days of conservation-focused activities-the main tournament May 17-18. Divers have the opportunity to compete for prize money totaling nearly \$100,000 in categories like most lionfish caught and largest and smallest lionfish.



Participants in the Lionfish Festival can expect a diverse range of events, including lionfish hunting tournaments, educational seminars, cooking demonstrations featuring lionfish cuisine, and live music. Local marine biologists and conservationists will lead discussions on the ecological impact of lionfish and strategies for their management. Emerald Coast Open Restaurant Week offers the public unique lionfish dishes prepared by chefs at local restaurants. Each evening, a local restaurant serves a unique lionfish dish on their menu. The fish caught pre-tournament are provided to the participating restaurants to serve. Each dish is also judged and the winning chef crowned at the end of the week.

Moreover, the festival provides an opportunity for the community to come together and support local businesses involved in sustainable fishing practices. By promoting the consumption of lionfish as a delicacy, the festival encourages a market-driven approach to control their population while providing economic opportunities for fishermen.

As visitors immerse themselves in the festivities, they also contribute to a larger conservation effort. Proceeds from the festival support ongoing research and conservation initiatives aimed at mitigating the impact of lionfish on the delicate balance of marine ecosystems.

The Lionfish Festival is more than just an event; it's a testament to the power of community-driven conservation. By joining forces to combat the invasive lionfish, residents and visitors alike are making a tangible difference in preserving the natural beauty of the Emerald Coast for generations to come.

## 6 Ways to Improve Your Heart Health

Every year, we set great resolutions for our health. Unfortunately, we usually forget them quickly. This year, don't miss the opportunity to reprioritize your heart health. Heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women according to the CDC, but many cardiac events are preventable. There are no quick fixes, but there are some easy steps you can take to make a difference.

Follow these tips to take control of your heart health in 2024.

## Tip 1: See Your Doctor for Annual Screening

Your risk of developing heart disease increases as you age. According to research published by the Journal of the American Heart Association, people over age 40 have a 1-in-4 lifetime risk of developing AFib, or atrial fibrillation, a common heart rhythm condition. Scheduling regular visits with your primary care doctor and any specialists you see can help catch problems sooner rather than later, which can be lifesaving in some cases.

Especially if you experience high blood pressure or high cholesterol, make doctor's visits

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a priority to keep a close eye on your heart health. At Ascension St. Vincent's, our teams of primary care doctors and cardiologists, including those at our hospital in St. Johns County, can provide you with the most effective screening methods to check for heart disease and other conditions.

### **Tip 2: Monitor Your Heart Health**

Many of our patients use personal technology, like portable medical-grade EKG devices, to help monitor their hearts from home. These devices can help doctors detect heart rhythm irregularities sooner, which can sometimes help make a diagnosis or even prevent a stroke. But not all technology is created equal. For example, a less complex heart rate monitor and one that is built to be an EKG-grade device may show differing results

### Tip 3: Avoid Excessive Stress

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We all experience stress, but excessive and prolonged stress can contribute to heart issues like blood vessel constriction and high blood pressure, elevating the risk of a heart attack and stroke. Regular exercise is a key stress reducer. Whether



it's a brisk walk, yoga, or a fitness class, physical activity benefits both the heart and mental health.

### **Tip 4: Focus on Moderation**

Alcohol is often linked to heart problems, notably increasing the risk of AFib. An observational study in the European Heart Journal found that even one daily glass of wine or beer led to a 16 percent higher risk of developing AFib (compared to not drinking). AFib, in turn, increases the risk of stroke, heart failure, and cardiac arrest. While enjoying a glass of wine is fine, moderation is key. Exceeding two drinks in a day is never heart-healthy.

## Tip 5: Stick to Healthy Eating Habits

Try to limit salty foods, such as canned or processed foods. Also limit high-fat foods, such

as red meat, cheese, and baked goods. When it comes to a heart-healthy diet, the important thing is to maintain balance. A Mediterranean-style diet high in vegetables, fruits, lean proteins, and whole grains has been shown to promote weight loss and reduce heart disease risk.

## Tip 6: Know the Signs of Stroke and Don't Delay Treatment

Recognizing the warning signs of stroke can protect both yourself and your loved ones. The important acronym to remember for identifying a stroke is B.E. F.A.S.T. That stands for balance, eyes/vision loss, face drooping, arm weakness, speech difficulty, and time to call 911. It's common to mistake or minimize the signs of stroke, but don't delay treatment. Call 911.

What sparked this month's topic? I ran a report for our grocery expenditures for February; what a shock!

As we maneuver through the times we're in, creating new habits around how we shop and consume can improve our health and wallets. Below are nine health tips with thoughts to help reduce spending at checkout:

• Focus on eating more fruits and veggies. A salad with every meal will usually create more leftovers which creates another meal at no added cost. Also, buying fresh vegetables offers multiple lunches and side dishes.

Non-processed foods will always offer health benefits. Salads don't always have to be served with lettuce. Consider brown rice, quinoa or gluten free noodles. Change up the veggies for variety. Serve the salad warm vs.

• Who doesn't love a delicious plate of spaghetti or lasagna? Dishes like this are filling and can be stretched. A big pot of sauce can give you several dishes: spaghetti, lasagna, or dinnerin-a-dish (seashell noodles, veggies, sauce and cheese). Be sure to par-boil (not quite done) noodles. Doing this slows down how quickly the sugar in the noodles is absorbed.

· Scratch baking can also save money. Replace white sugar with Turbinado (cane sugar), honey, date sugar or pure maple syrup. Check the prices on these. Raw honey and pure maple syrup can be pricey, but they also require a much smaller amount due to their sweetness which also makes it last longer. On the health side, the body recognizes

these natural sweeteners as real food which allows it to be broken down easier

- Cut your white flour in half with almond flour, oat flour (You can make this by grinding whole rolled oats.) or another less processed flour. This cuts down on the sugar impact on the body.
- If you're a yogurt person, switch up to plain low-fat Greek or regular yogurt. It should have only two-three ingredients. Add your own fruit (frozen fruit works well) and add nuts, seeds, and a touch of honey or maple syrup. This is cost effective and makes a great breakfast or lunch.
  - Supplement with

high-quality vitamin. The company should be able to guarantee that the ingredients on the label are in each and every tablet. Consumer Lab tested 74 products and found defects in 40% of them. Taking control of our health includes becoming more informed with what we are putting in our bodies.

- Soup! I love soup. It's filled with all kinds of good stuff, from chili to veggie to chicken tortilla soup. I've found with soup that by cutting the chicken up in smaller bites I can stretch my chicken breasts for more meals. And, soup usually always allows for left overs. Tacos are another way to stretch out ingredients.
- Make your own beans. You can make a big pot and freeze them. Soak them over night. Rinse and fill the pot with fresh water and cook until done. An Insta-Pot cooks them quickly. You can also crockpot them on high for a few hours. This is a great savings and offers us the benefit of less salt in our diet.
  - Replace cereal with oat-

meal. Soak it in the bowl overnight in milk or water. Serve hot or cold. add nuts, seeds, fruit, nut butters, natural sweeteners, etc. You can also add a few chocolate chips (dark chocolate) for a little treat. The benefits of this one is huge. You're cutting back on starches and a high amount of sugar.

• Lastly, consider a garden. If you're like us, growing a garden has it challenges. To make this less overwhelming, grab some neighbors and friends. One can grow tomatoes, another peppers, another squash, another lettuce and so on. Then you can share with each other. You can use containers, growing bags, etc. If you have a green thumb the ground works too :-). You can even grow flowers for sharing.

Have an amazing spring. I hope the above thoughts spark you to think outside the box. Here's to Health!



When did you last interact with a difficult person? Maybe the difficult person has anger problems, behaves with superiority, doesn't treat others the way they expect to be treated or is generally unkind, mean or rude. Sometimes you might label people as difficult when they have different values, opinions, religious views, political leanings or personalities than you. When are differences just different rather than difficult? When do you invest energy in making space for different ways of moving through the world vs. investing energy in addressing boundary crossings by people who seem to disrespect you or others?

While easy to overlook, sometimes you might be the difficult person. Self-awareness is a skill developed through uncomfortable practice. Noticing when you may tend towards being judgmental, short-fused, selfish or unkind can go a long way in helping you sort interactions with others. Noticing your capability of being difficult and your need for grace when you aren't your best self can inspire increased humility when ad-

dressing difficulty in others.

A common way to deal with difficult people is to become difficult yourself. When someone is rude, you may feel the invitation to match the rudeness. When someone is mean, you may spend time brainstorming ways to inflict vengeance. While these approaches can bring short term satisfaction and a false sense of justice, you end up giving up healthy emotional control and compromising your character. Over time, matching others' difficult behavior leads to bitterness, resentment, drama, shame and poor character habits. So, how do you address difficult behavior in healthy

#### 7 Ways to Navigate **Interactions with Difficult**

- 1. Evaluate. Determine what is happening in a situation. What is bothering you and why? What is tough or feels like a boundary crossing?
- 2. Sort past emotion from present. Notice if something about this situation is bringing up feelings from past events/relationships that may be intensifying your emotions in the present. If so, take time to process past feelings separately to give you an accurate perspective in the current situation.
- 3. Sort differences from difficulty. Ask yourself if the other person is showing poor character vs. has different opinions, values, perspective than you. Make space for difference. Address poor character.

- 4. Set boundaries. Use kind, direct words and tone to clearly state how the other party is crossing a boundary, how it impacts the relationship, what you will do differently and what you would like for them to do differently. "When you belittle me in front of others, I feel disrespected and emotionally unsafe in our relationship. I won't participate in conversations where I am belittled and disrespected. When talking to me, please use respect." If the other party respects your boundary and makes a change, that is an indicator of movement toward health. If the other party continues to cross boundaries or responds poorly to your boundary setting, that is information you need to understand the low value the other party places on the relationship.
- 5. Speak up for those whose voices are hard to hear. Sometimes difficult people cross boundaries resulting in negativity, abuse, or injustice for those who are vulnerable. Try using your voice and boundary setting for the sake of others.
- **6. Distance.** Once a person has established an ongoing pat-

tern of crossing boundaries and poor character they are unwilling to address, it's appropriate to create various forms of distance including limiting conversational topics, time, space, emotional energy/investment, and financial involvement. You have power to give your energy and resourc-

es to life-giving relationships and to withhold energy from life-draining relationships.

7. Disengage. Try practicing forgiveness toward difficult people for the sake of your own peace and character. Release

your right to vengeance and let the relationship go. You have the power to discern when relationships need to end. Disengaging is not defeat. In fact, you win by sustaining good character and recapturing energy to invest in pursuits that bring positive meaning to your life and those around you.

Navigating relationships with difficult people is challenging but inevitable. Practicing boundaries will grow your confidence. As you seek support along your journey, connect with us at Journeybravely.com for counseling and coaching.

Students at Choctawhatchee

Upon completion of the two-year program, students will be eligible to earn a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), a Certified Patient Care Technician (CPCT), and/ or Electrocardiogram Technician (EKG) certification. Juniors who complete the program will have the opportunity for dual enrollment in the LPN program at Okaloosa Technical College



during their senior year, and get a head start on earning their required course hours toward an LPN license.

"We are grateful for this pioneering collaboration, alongside the invaluable support and funding provided by Triumph Gulf Coast for this program," said April Branscome, OCSD Career and Technical Education Program Director. "This marks a historic milestone as the first initiative of its kind nationwide, ushering in a transformative era in healthcare education. There was a loud party happening on Main Street.

I followed the sound of distant music and many voices. I suddenly realized I was still wearing my pajamas. I shuffled into town barefoot, with sleep crusted in my eyes.

The sun was shining. Birds were cackling. People were everywhere. It was a veritable town-wide hoedown.

I saw women positioning casseroles on card tables. I saw children playing tag. Old men in aprons were deep frying hunks of fish.

There was music playing at the hardware store. Good music. The kind with twin fiddles. People were dancing before a plywood stage. Each front porch was crowded with people drinking lemonade and sugary tea.

Everyone was there, the whole gang. I saw them all. All my loved ones who died and left me behind. All my friends who met untimely ends. All my relatives who were called home too early. All my kin.

They were all right here, holding plates of hot food, mingling with one another. Everybody was smiling, throwing their heads back, laughing until they couldn't breathe.

I saw grandparents, deceased uncles, departed aunts, and cousins who died before they were old enough to know what life was about.

I saw multitudes of unfamiliar children, dancing while the musicians played "Turkey in the Straw." I asked an old woman nearby who all these children were

"Those are the babies who died in the womb," the woman said. "Aren't they precious?"

We were interrupted when



a large pack of dogs came running through the town, careening up Main Street. They came stampeding like a herd of bison. Among them, I saw six of my own dogs.

I saw Lady, the cocker spaniel who died in my arms when I was a teenager. I saw Joe, who was hit by an SUV in a hit and run. I saw Boone, the collie-mix who died in a veterinary office while gazing into my eyes. I saw Ellie Mae, the bloodhound I'll never get over.

In a nearby park, I watched old friends play baseball. Mister Reginald was pitching—the retired Methodist minister who once lived on my street.

I saw my grandmother, standing at home plate, holding a hickory bat in her hands. Lord have mercy. She was a teenager, long and beautiful, with raven hair and Hershey's Kiss eyes.

After the ball game, I was hungry. So I found a paper plate and stood in line at one of the food tables. A guy in line said, "Sean! Don't you remember me?"

I stared at him, but didn't recognize his face.

"It's me!" he finally said. "James!"

"JAMES!" I screamed. James and I were friends as kids. He died driving home from his very first job. He wrecked his car on the interstate. I sat on the front row at his funeral and wept alongside his sisters.

Mid-hug, I saw someone else familiar. She was standing behind a food table, serving people. I knew those two fiery eyes, flecked with tinges of playfulness. It was my mother-in-law.

She was behind a crockpot,

wielding a long spoon, wearing an apron that said "KISS ME, I'M METHODIST."

When she recognized me, she shouted my name and came running around the table to hug me. It was a colossal embrace that made my ribs squeak.

"You have no idea how much we all miss you back home," I told her.

Next, I saw Aunt Judith, Uncle Tommy Lee, the Williams boy, my old Little League coach, Cousin Elroy, Cousin Rose, Cousin Ray, and dear Mrs. Betty Lamb, who taught me in elementary school. I saw hundreds more familiar faces. Maybe thousands.

Then an old woman grabbed my arm and said, "There's one more person you need to meet, sweetie."

She led me to the edge of town, to a meandering river. There, on a shallow wooden bridge sat a young man, feet dangling over the edge, trousers rolled up to his knees. He was holding a long fishing rod like a grown-up version of Huck Finn.

He saw me.

He stood.

My God, he was so young. He was so very young and so very lean. He had a mess of red hair atop his head, and his patent pending matinee smile was unchanged. He was wearing the same shirt he died in.

We embraced and I heard myself say his name. A word I've been waiting to use for a long time.

"Daddy."

I could smell his deodorant, a scent I haven't known in years. I could feel his lean trunk beneath my arms, and his beating heart only inches from my own.

"What is this wonderful place?" I asked my father.

"Does it matter?" he said


"Yes, it matters. Because I don't ever want to leave."

He smiled. "Neither do any of us."

Then I woke up.

Her story is a testament to the power of steadfast love and loyalty, even when days for her were darkest. It reminds us that true faithfulness often shines brightest against trials and tribulations.

At the core of these narratives is a profound understanding of



faithfulness, not just as a religious virtue, but as a guiding principle throughout life. 

# Sinfonia Becomes Orchestra of Nearly 3,000 Students During Link Up: The Orchestra Rocks

On March 6, the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Convention Center in Fort Walton Beach was transformed into an electrifying concert hall when Sinfonia Gulf Coast — the only fully professional non-profit orchestra on the Emerald Coast founded in 2005 by music and artistic director Demetrius Fuller — presented its 12th live Link Up concert performance "The Orchestra Rocks," a national program it presented in partnership with New York's Carnegie Hall Weill Institute of Music.

This year's Link Up program showcased the talents of nearly 3,000 local 3rd-5th grade students from Okaloosa and Walton Counties performing on recorder and singing. The concert was conducted by Sinfonia Gulf Coast Maestro Fuller.

With recorders in hand, the students performed from their seats when given their cue by Maestro Fuller to join the Sinfonia Gulf Coast orchestra for a range of pieces from Come to Play by Thomas Cabansis, La Follia by Antonio Vivaldi, excerpts from Igor Stravinsky's The Rite of Spring, O Fortuna from Carmina Burana and others. But these inspired kids didn't stay in their seats at this spirited performance which ended with a celebration of Chuck Berry's Johnny B. Goode they were up out of their chairs singing, dancing moves and parts they have been practicing for months.

This curriculum is geared towards 3rd-5th grade students, and in many cases locally, is the only music education that they receive during the school year. The theme of this year's Link Up program was centered around discovering how elements of rhythm and time can unite musicians, singers and audiences.

Sinfonia's Link Up program is funded in part by the St. Joe Community Foundation, the Dugas Family Foundation and the Emeril Lagasse Family Foundation. Additional fund-

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
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
