Fort Walton Beach's Liberty Bell Celebrates Its 10th Anniversary

On Sept. 11, 2014, the Freedom Bell that hangs in the Veterans Tribute Tower at Beal Memorial Cemetery was dedicated and rung for the first time by Navy Veteran, Governor Rick Scott. The threeday casting process was accomplished locally at Uptown Station by the Verdin Foundry from Cincinnati, Ohio. The date chosen for the bell casting was in recognition of those who were lost on Sept. 11, 2001.

On that day, al-Qaeda terrorists, an Islamist extremist group, hijacked four commercial airplanes en route from the East Coast. In coordinated attacks, the planes were turned into weapons. Two of the planes were intentionally flown into the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center, a global

business complex in New York City, causing the towers to collapse. A third plane also hit the Pentagon, headquarters for the U.S. Department of Defense, in Arlington, Va. The fourth plane was headed toward Washington, D.C. But, brave passengers and crew banded together and forced the plane to crash into a field in Shanksville, Pa.

2,977 people died in the 9/11 attacks—441 of them first responders. It was the single largest loss of life resulting from a foreign attack on American soil and the greatest loss of emergency responders on a single day in American history.



The Smallest Vectors Can Cause Great Problems

Did you know that mosquitos kill more people than any other creature on Earth? It's been said that knowledge is power and in the case of mosquito-borne illnesses, this information can save your life. What do Dengue, Chikungunya, West Nile, Equine Encephalitis and Zika Viruses have in common? These are tropical mosquito born viruses, but it appears the Zika Virus is spreading globally. The Zika virus is so named, because it is believed to have originated in the Zika forest of Uganda in Africa and was first reported in the 1940's. There are currently one million cases worldwide with 29 confirmed cases in Florida; this

count rises daily. The most cases are in Miami-Dade (38%). In Northwest Florida, one case was reported in Santa Rosa County. None of these originated in the U.S. Those who have this disease were infected in another country while traveling. One case in Texas was sexually transmitted to the spouse of a missionary upon his return. Once a person is infected, they become a host for up to seven days; and if a mosquito bites them, the mosquito can transmit the disease to another person.

The leading spokesman and educator about Zika virus since 2017 is Dr. Anthony Fauci (yes, the same Fauci that we all know from COVID). Dr. Fauci is re-

covering currently from West Nile Virus that he believes he caught in his backyard, in the D.C. metropolitan area.

All the above-mentioned viruses, including Zika, are transmitted by the bite of a mosquito, or human saliva, blood transfusion or sexual transmission. Blood banks in the U.S. are safe and do not accept, per FDA guidelines, blood donations from people who have traveled to areas with active transmission of Zika in the last 28 days. There is currently no cure or vaccine. Antibiotics are ineffective, because it is a virus not a bacterial infection. Once infected with the Zika virus, the symptoms begin within 2-5 days. Some cases are mild and some people experience no symptoms. In the beginning, there is a fever, rash, joint pain and red in the white of the eyes. Treat with acetaminophen (Tylenol) only as this inflammatory disease is made worse by medications such as Aspirin. The second stage for the disease includes headaches, aching behind the eyes and vomiting. Bed rest and hydration are recommended. A diagnosis can be made by a physician with a blood titer.

Complications can arise for pregnant women, because the virus passes through the umbilical cord. There are currently nine pregnancy cases in the U.S. where the mother is infected with Zika. In Brazil, studies are underway to confirm that children born to infected mothers have birth defects such as microcephaly. The CDC is working to investigate the link in Brazil. In addition to pregnancy, it appears the virus can begin to ravage the nervous systems producing crippling diseases in adults. There have been cases of complications with Guillain-Barré Syndrome, a type of paralysis. In some adults, it causes a form of crippling arthritic symptoms.

The mosquito that carries this disease is a common one in Florida known as the Tiger mosquito. Once these mosquitos become infected, they become aggressive daytime biters. They can also bite at night. This is uncommon for these vectors. because, as most of us know, they feed at dusk or dawn. They have no issues with following you inside of your home where other mosquitoes shun the temperature difference. The Okaloosa mosquito control program monitors 12 trap sites throughout the county in locations of known heavy mosquito activity. No Tiger mosquitos have been trapped since last October. The Tiger mosquito is rare in the winter, but will begin to hatch this spring, all through the summer and into fall.

What can be done? Okaloosa County has an aggressive campaign to destroy mosquitos through spray. If a case is detected in Okaloosa County, additional emergency state funds are available to combat



cannot keep us from a massive outbreak. All citizens must partner with the county in this fight. Mosquitos can breed in water as small as the amount found in fallen Magnolia leaves. This is important, because no leaf must be left unturned in your yards. Pots, gutters, birdbaths must be inspected for water which are prime breeding grounds. It only takes a few days for larvae to hatch once the eggs are laid in standing water. The Tiger mosquitos do not travel far in their lifespan; most hatch and live within a mile of your property. So, wear protective clothing and use an insect repellant product with an EPA-registered insect repellent. If you use sunscreen, apply sunscreen before applying insect repellent. Special clothing is made that has insect repellent as part of the fabric for outdoor protection. Wear long-sleeved shirts and pants. Make sure your windows and door screens are in good repair. If you contact this disease, you can spread it to a loved one with an exchange of bodily fluid.

To date, in 2024, there have been only travel related cases of Dengue and Chikungun-ya. Those individuals isolated themselves until they were no longer capable of transmitting the disease.

Mosquitos are a year-round problem. In Florida, and especially in Okaloosa County, we are actually fortunate that we have such a well-managed Mosquito control program. Working together as a community, we can mitigate the inevitable spread of this disease with education and a willingness to understand the historical fight we are in against an insect that continues to reinvent misery under different names

Bit-Wizards: Making It So

Vince Mayfield and Louis Erickson have been "making it so" for decades. This phrase, used by Captain Picard in Star Trek: The Next Generation, exemplifies the can-do, success-oriented and innovation-driven team at Bit-Wizards.

Bit-Wizards has been an ever-evolving company, but the constant is the friendship of Vince and Louis. Growing up in Okaloosa County, they attended Meigs Junior High and Choctawhatchee High School. They knew each other from ROTC and Civil Air Patrol. Though there was a two-grade level difference in their ages, they became best friends. Their friendship has spanned decades of change, challenges and family tragedies.

The friendship continued after high school when they roomed together in college. Louis majored in computer science, minoring in mathematics and physics. Vince majored in mathematics and minored in computer science, and aerospace science. He also earned a Master's of Science Degree

in International Relations. Later, Vince earned a MBA from the University Of Notre Dame. Louis served in the U.S. Navy. Vince served in the U.S. Army and U.S. Air Force.

Their civilian careers began with writing software for Department of Defense and defense contractor projects. Louis moved to Austin, Texas, to care for his late sister's son. He procured a contract re-writing software for the power and light industry. He asked Vince to come to Austin. They decided it was the time to form a business together.

Vince brought his two dogs to join Louis's two cats and slept on the floor of Louis's house. Working like dogs for 18 months writing code, they worked 60 to 80 hours a week. They were going to call their new company Bit Wise, a play on words in the programming world, but the name was taken. Louis remembered an old teacher at the University of West Florida who joked about "stirring the smoke" and how people thought computers made things happen magically. The Bit-Wiz-



ards name is meant to be ironic, when behind the curtain, a lot of hard work is going on.

During the dotcom boom in Austin, the partners designed a logo and went to the mall to get shirts made. They wanted to operate like a big business. As they were winding down their project, the dotcom bust happened. Vince, worried about the economy, said they should move back to Fort Walton Beach where there was less traffic, a slower pace of life, and less competition. They paid off all personal debts, Vince moved back, and Louis stayed in Austin another six months.

Vince secured two new contracts and they reincorporated Bit-Wizards in Florida. Working out of Vince's house until a new building was ready, more 60 to 80-hour weeks followed. While

Louis was resistant to moving back, he was soon glad he did. One of his cats got sick two months after returning. He met his wife, Tabitha, at the Veterinary clinic and asked her out. They've been married over 20 years.

Bit-Wizard's first involvement in the economic and community development world was with Florida's Great Northwest and then the Economic Development Council (EDC) and chambers of commerce. It was a challenge procuring commercial work in the middle of the DoD arena. Their work was primarily outside the local area. When September 11th happened, they lost several contracts and went through a time of struggle. Louis sold his house in Austin and Vince took out an SBA Loan against his house and got a personal loan from his dad. Additionally, they used savings and credit cards to make it through. The business had obligations including insurance and internet connection costs. They had enough money to support the business, but not enough to pay themselves. Thank God

they had paid off their debts earlier.

They had to back out of the EDC and the chambers to focus on getting customers. Most small businesses can't afford custom software. While most of their customers are local, the largest share of dollars are out of the local area. Vince and Louis later reengaged with the EDC and chamber when they could sustain the costs. When they did re-join, they found relationships created were of inestimable value.

A new contract out of New Jersey created a need for employees. Their first employee, John Jackson, is still with them today. Employees mean as much to Vince and Louis as customers do. It's who they are as human beings. They know de-stressing their employees, keeping them inspired, motivated, taken care of and happy makes for happy customers. Employees can do their best work when they feel valued. The Bit-Wizards mis-

The Power of Hope: **Opportunity Place Provides a Sanctuary for Families**

Fiona Devenney, the Executive Director of Opportunity Place, knows that one of the best sources of energy in a community is this: Hope. Her team, although small, is mighty, and includes Balon Loften (Associate Director), Felicia Waters (Eligibility Specialist), Gabrielle Loften (Shelter Coordinator), and Jean Day (Youth Services/ Volunteer Coordinator). This dedicated group has positioned itself to receive families in Okaloosa and Walton Counties who need an injection of hope when life's circumstances make it hard to know what to do next, or where to go. Having a background in working at domestic violence shelters and caring for the homeless, Fiona has always been involved in social services. She knows a family doesn't have to be defined by their circum-

"I think that the most important thing to know is that the families we serve were once in their own homes. They were once an intact family unit, had jobs, had vehicles, and had the American dream. And then something happened, whether it was divorce, a death in the family, domestic violence, or they fell into an addiction, lots of reasons bring them here. Our families want to succeed. They want to get back to that hope. Children in our shelter, especially, didn't have a say about how life would go. That's why it's so important for us to give the whole family the dignity they deserve."

So, how does Fort Walton Beach-based Opportunity Place preserve dignity? By making it possible for families to become self-sufficient again. This means meeting them where they are



and taking care of foundational needs, so the family has a place to launch. When a parent knows their family is safe, fed and has shelter, they have the margin to address their challenges and get sustainable jobs, secure additional skills, find their housing and, when needed, address addiction.

"We're not just a shelter. For example, we offer classes on parenting skills and budgeting. We teach about health and nutrition, life skills, how to write a resume, and do a job interview. Many of our families have endured a lot and have never experienced group living so we also offer classes on coping with group living and trauma. When they're ready, we also help them with their housing.

We also have an amazing program for our children. Children are resilient, but they need hope, too. We want to help take their fear away so they can excel in education and life. At Opportunity Place, our Case Manager and Youth Services Coordinator partner with the parents to identify what areas might require expert intervention and get to the resources that best meet the needs of the child."

What is unique about Opportunity Place is that it allows the family to define what a family consists of, not just mother and child. They include men and grandparents who have custody of children. To keep everyone safe, there are cameras throughout the three buildings, except for the sleeping areas where each family stays together, that make up Opportunity Place. Two of the buildings serve as housing with laundry facilities

and bathrooms and the third includes a kitchen, dining and additional common areas. All in all, 43 beds throughout the different bedrooms can accommodate various sizes of families. Each room has bunk beds and/ or full and twin-size beds, and can also include space for infants when needed. In the first 30 days, a family can reset. They work with staff to figure out what their unique needs are so resources can start being built. Employment must be secured in that first month if the family wants to continue to stay up to the 90 days allowed. In those 90 days, the goal is for the family to become independent enough to move into their own housing, and Opportunity Place is there every step along the way.

So, how can a community invest in its own health? By supporting organizations like Opportunity Place. In addition to donating supplies, funds and volunteer time, another fun and meaningful way is to join them at their fundraiser, the Harlem Nights Casino Affair, on October 4th, 2024. This marks 16 years of providing shelter to families and the event will be held from 6 - 10 p.m. at The Is-

land Resort in Ft. Walton Beach at 1500 Miracle Strip Parkway Southeast. This incredible night will consist of gaming tables, champagne and hors d'oeuvres, music by Boukou Groove, dancing, live and silent auctions, and a photo booth by Epic. Each ticket is \$100 and that provides you with \$500 worth of casino bucks to use at the event!

sion, values and culture are celebrated on their website: https://bitwizards.com. Vince and Louis credit their military careers, in large part, for developing the values of service-mindedness, ownership thinking, and empowering individuals to be part of a team. A team of "wizards."

Vince and Louis also believe in doing the right thing for their community. Raised here, Vince has kids who go to school here. Bit-Wizards invested \$250,000 in the half-penny school tax designed to address the poor physical condition of local schools.

Personal responsibility is inseparable from business responsibility for Vince and Louis. Every year, Bit-Wizards pays a company \$100,000 to try and hack into Bit-Wizards from the outside and from the inside. Their rating has improved every time. Vince and Louis feel they owe this to their customers who are counting on them for security of their own businesses.

Bit-Wizards has evolved from a custom software and digital marketing company to solely a managed IT company. Their sweet spot is servicing small to medium size companies with 10 to 50 users. Updating and managing IT infrastructure is critical for businesses. Louis uses one example of a deadbolt. While it increases inconvenience because you have another step opening the door, your security is increased.

Vince and Louis have defined core values and created success. It hasn't always been easy. They have learned and are humble. They don't think they know everything, but think they have made more good decisions than bad ones.

Meet Our Hometown Hero:

Zachary Woodard and Lightz of Hope

One of the greatest forces for good can be a child looking out for other children. Zachary Woodard was such a child and LightZ of Hope is his legacy through his parents, Brent and Susan, along with their team. Through this program, children who are hospitalized can receive fun lights that project color onto their walls and ceiling to create an atmosphere of fun and joy during a stay that might be hard and extended. The lights not only brighten their days, but also those of the staff and visitors as well.

Zachary was born on May 20, 2003, at 4 lbs., unable to breathe on his own or swallow. At one-month-old, he went through surgery for a tracheotomy and g-tube. Shortly after, he was diagnosed with Myotubular Myopathy, a disease that causes the muscles to stop developing. Needing a ventilator to help him breathe, he battled with numerous hospitalizations due to pneumonia or infection; however, even though his muscles were weak, he had a sharp mind.

Susan shares the day that Zachary planted the seed for their foundation. "Zachary was recovering from his spi-

nal surgery when a dear friend came to visit us at the hospital and brought a strand of color-changing Christmas lights to decorate his room. Our friend, Monica, hung the lights around the bedrails, and every morning I would get up and turn the lights on. These very simple, inexpensive lights changed this sterile uninviting environment into an uplifting welcoming space. When Zachary woke up, he told me how much he liked his lights. That sweet face looked up at me and asked, 'Do you think we could do this for other kids?' I had the biggest smile on my face and responded, 'Buddy! I love that idea! Let's talk more about that when we get home.' Well, Zachary went to be with Jesus not long after that conversation—very quickly and very unexpectedly he went to his eternal home.

Driving home from the hospital that day without Zachary was a total shock, but then it hit me. I said to my husband, Brent, 'I know what God wants us to do! Zachary told me! We are supposed to gift lights to other kids who are being hospitalized.' The idea for the foundation was born. After some collaboration with Zachary's friends and

family, we landed on LightZ of Hope. The capital Z is for Zachary. Hope is for all the medically fragile kids and their families. We all need hope to visualize a pathway towards something better. Our pastor used to say, 'We all need hope to cope.' And we do!"

Susan and her family know that the greatest relief from caring for a child with severe illness







or disability can come from a community that just lets you know you aren't walking it out alone. "Friends showed up at the hospital and prayed for us and with us. Sometimes, people did not know what to do, but they showed up. We call that the 'showing up ministry.' One of the ways we were supported

was through meals and groceries. There was one lady in our small group who brought us a meal every week for months. There was another lady who would show up just to bring us groceries."

Having felt that outpouring from her own circle, LightZ of Hope has grown in scope and opportunity into the CareZ program. "We also now provide financial assistance to families in a medical crisis. Families are identified through the social workers at the hospital and referred for a specific need like rental assistance due to loss of income. Other needs can include meals in the hospital, medications not covered by insurance, etc."

Even as they miss him every day, getting to be there for other families has been a great source of joy for Zachary's family. "Since we started our foundation, I have so many favorite stories, but this one in particular speaks to my heart. In December 2021, we had the privilege of providing financial support for many families in medical crisis. Brent and I had decided in advance that we would bless each family with \$1000 during the Christmas season and I got to call each family personally to notify them. After one family was notified, the mother began to cry and exclaimed, 'God

heard my prayers!' She said that the previous evening, she laid a bill on the table that they were unable to pay. The overdue bill was \$990. She cried out to God for a way to pay this bill. Of course, we had nothing to do with any of those details, but God knew, and He met their needs through our foundation. We were able to be a light in their dark circumstances and were used to meet this family's needs."

Since their first delivery, The Zachary Woodard Foundation has gifted almost 10,000 LightZ of Hope across the U.S. and Alaska and has provided over \$400,000 in financial assistance. Looking to grow their reach in Northwest Florida, they are hoping to find local partners who will help them develop the fundraising and outreach effort of their CareZ program by expanding their network of volunteers and donors. Changes for Homebuyers Due to NAR Settlement

The National Association of Realtors' (NAR) settlement with the Department of Justice came into effect nationwide on August 17, 2024. Our local association, the Emerald Coast Association of Realtors, implemented the changes on August 12, 2024. This settlement introduced changes to how real estate agents' compensations are handled in the MLS (Multiple Listing Services) and in real estate transactions.

One of the main changes is that buyer's agent compensation will no longer be listed in the MLS. While there are some differences in how things are processed, an agent's compensation on both sides of a transaction is, and always has been, negotiable. Florida has been one of 11 states that didn't require a buyer to sign an agreement with an agent to enlist their services in purchasing a home. Now, nationwide, buyers will need to sign a brokerage agreement before an agent can show the buyer any property listed in the MLS.

As a buyer, you must sign a written agreement with a broker/agent before touring a home, whether in person or virtually. This agreement should in-

clude the services and value that will be provided to you, and the cost of those services, thus securing your agent to work solely on your behalf as a buyer. Once you have reached an agreement and begin your home search, your agent will be working with you to secure your dream home. After you find a home that you like and want to make an offer, your agent will negotiate the best offer which meets your financial situation. That can include asking the seller to pay some or all of the compensation due to your agent, which is permitted. But, the offer cannot be shared on a MLS. Also, the amount your agent receives cannot exceed the amount you agreed to in your brokerage agreement. You do not need a written agreement if you are just speaking to an agent at an open house or asking them about their services. You can still accept concessions from the seller, such as offers to pay your closing costs or buy down your interest rate. 





You Can't Know Until You Know

Our oldest son walked away from us and into his dorm just before we headed out of town after the first college move in. The symbolic moment of him walking away from his child-hood and into his adulthood wasn't lost on me and brought some tears. Now we begin the redefining of a new version of life and relationship as we navigate simultaneous joy, gratitude, grief, pride and excitement.



Many parents have gone before us launching kids. We listened, cared and expressed compassion. However, without having walked the road ourselves, we didn't deeply understand that particular experience. We couldn't know until we knew. Now, we see this family transition with new eyes, fresh emotions and have a deeper empathy to offer those who come after us. We will send a thoughtful text, take a mom for lunch, tell a Dad he might feel sadder than he is expecting, give longer hugs, and check on people weeks after the move in.

While pain isn't unique to the human experience, we all walk through different brands of pain at different moments. Your pain is your own and needs its own space to be felt and processed.

And, your pain journey can also be an invitation to care for others with similar pain in

uniquely empathic ways. If you've walked through divorce, you understand what those walking through divorce might be feeling and needing. If you've walked through cancer diagnosis, you understand what those walking through cancer might be feeling and needing.

So, how do you use your experience to extend care and empathy to others walking a similar road to the one you've walked?

10 Ways to Care for Others from Your Experience:

Give your personal pain space. Take the time to understand your experience, feel your feelings, and reflect on what you're learning. Seek support as you process your pain.

Notice the pain of others. Be aware and curious about pain others might be experiencing. Extend compassion broadly to others while noticing when a person's pain might

align more closely to something you've experienced.

Remember how you felt in your body and thoughts in the midst of pain. What did you need? What would have helped you feel seen and cared for? Explore remembering your

pain as a brainstorm while also being mindful that each person may have different needs.

Listen with validation. Ask curious, open ended questions. How are you feeling lately? What is this like for you on the inside? How are you navigating this transition emotionally? Then remind the person their feelings are normal. I understand why you're feeling sad, this is really sad.

Ask how you can support them. Sometimes people aren't quite sure what they need but other times they can tell you clearly. Remember to ask.

Offer encouraging words. Send a card, text or call letting them know you are thinking about them and care about their experience.

Offer practical gestures. Deliver dinner, take them to coffee, take them a basket of snacks, provide house cleaning services.

Offer kindness. Send flowers, a thoughtful item through the mail, leave something thoughtful on their porch.

Offer your presence. Offer a hug, to sit with someone and listen, invite them on a walk, or offer to do something they enjoy.

Follow up. Put reminders in

your calendar and/or reach out to check in when you think of the person consistently over time.

Your understanding and empathy can be a meaningful gift to someone else walking through hard things. Remember the care you offer is for the other person and not to fill a need in your-

self to provide care. And, at the same time, providing empathic care to others does often result in deeper healing within you.

Some of us have sedentary seasons, others have sedentary jobs and others have sedentary lifestyles. The definition of sedentary is settled as in non-migratory, not physically active or permanently attached like the barnacles on a boat or the couch showing visitors exactly where you sit most of the time.

Factors that add to physical inactivity include environmental factors including traffic congestion, air pollution, shortage of parks and walking paths as well as technology devices from phones to televisions. Sedentary jobs have increased 83% since 1950 versus physically active jobs which now make up less than 20% of the U.S. workforce, down by roughly half of jobs available in 1960.

No matter which of these categories we fall in, whether

Dangers of Living a Sedentary Lifestyle

seasonally or most of the time, the effects are the same. (Please note that this list does not cover the effects to circulation levels of sex hormones, circulation or body process changes.)

- Obesity Increased BP
- Higher blood sugar
- Excess body fat around waist (reduced metabolism impairs the body's ability to break down fat) Abnormal cholesterol level changes
- · Increased risk of cardiovascular disease and certain types of cancer due to elevated chronic inflammation
 - Type 2 diabetes
 - Muscle weakness
 - · Decreased flexibility

One study over a 15-year period tracked the negative effects a sedentary lifestyle had on mental wellbeing. A 2018 study of 1,237,194 people showed that those who exercised reported fewer mental health problems than those who did not. In another recent preliminary study scientists found sedentary lifestyles were linked to the thinning of the brain's amygdala in the temporal lobe which is the region critical to memory func-

In 2020, during the shut downs, many people experienced changes in their sleep



patterns. This caused mental fatigue fed by fear, stress and brain fog (sluggish, fuzzy, unable to focus).

Movement has been replaced by remote controls, blue tooth phones and digital recorders. And let's not forget electric scooters, golf carts, etc. Why do we try so hard to do so little? It's time to change our mindsets and get our bodies moving! If you are currently active, it's also important to look at the percentage of active vs sedentary. The threshold where sedentary can increase your health risk is about 10 hours daily.

Movement burns calories, increases energy, can help maintain muscle tone, affects mental wellness and decreases our desire to snack between meals.

We all know we should be exercising. However, we don't need to start with 30 minutes 3 times per week which is the doctor recommended amount (more often, if you want to increase muscle tone as well as your cardio strength). With that said, let's think outside of the box to get you 'moving' in the right direction.

During your sedentary times, move! Raise your shoulders and let them drop 10x. Perform right and left leg raises (10 on each side), practice squats during commercial breaks; 5 squats before heading to the kitchen and 5 more before settling back in. Stand up using one leg without arm assistance. Exercise your ankles by writing the alphabet with each foot. If your legs are

stretched out, lean forward and touch your toes. Do head circles and stretch your neck by letting your head hang (front, back, left side, right side).

You can also go for a walk around the block after dinner before sitting down for the evening. Use commercials to do jumping jacks, push-ups, skaters, knee raises, etc. Compete with other family members or friends and mix things up. Have your favorite song ready on your phone and dance during commercials. However you choose to start moving be sure to do it well, not half heartedly, as that won't get you the results you're going after.

Lastly, get a standing desk if you spend a lot of time in front of your computer. You can be active whether sitting or standing. Use the alarm on your phone to help you remember to move. You can also take the stairs instead of the elevator, take a lap around the office every hour or have a walking meeting instead of a conference room with doughnuts on the ta-

Be creative and have fun. Learn to love your body and your body will reward you.



Have an Accident? What You Should Do Right After

It can be scary to be driving along one minute, and the next, either you've been run off the road, or spun out into the intersection, or even into a ditch. You or your passenger might even be injured, and need medical attention. Here is the short version of how to handle auto accidents so that you know you handled everything correctly and your stress level can come down.

Pull over safely to the side of the road and call 911. Calling for help is the first

essential step in making sure that any injuries are treated in a timely fashion, as well as making sure the police arrive to do a full accident report.

Take photos of the other vehicle(s) involved including the drivers, as the position of the vehicles, for your insurance company, so that there is photo evidence of all damage as well as an accurate representation of who was in which car, as well who was driving.

Make sure you have your license, registration and insurance information on hand. I recommend keeping a copy of your declarations page, your auto id cards and your registration in your glove box.

If your vehicle is not drivable after the accident, you have two choices. If you have AAA, you can have them pick up your vehicle and drop it off at your preferred auto repair shop. If you have towing on your auto policy, and the site of your accident is less than five miles away from your repair shop, you can potentially use the towing coverage on your policy for this accident.

If you are injured, go to



the hospital to get checked

out or your primary care physician, if your injuries are not serious. Personal Injury Protection in the state of Florida pays 80% of your \$10,000 coverage, minus the deductible. This includes hospital bills, medical bills relating to your accident injuries, physical therapy, casts, crutches, etc. If you have medical payments on your policy as well, they will start where the Personal Injury Protection ends. If the at fault driver is not you, and they either have no bodily injury liability coverage, or not enough to cover your injuries, this is where uninsured/underinsured motorist coverage comes in. You insure for those times that you get hit, you're hurt, but the person who causes the accident does not have enough coverage to cover your medical expenses.

If you have not already called your insurance company to put in the claim, do so now, calling your agent and explaining to them what happened. Answer their questions and do not guess if you do not know the answer. Let them know that the police have been on the scene. Give them the

case number the police give you and they will get the accident report when it becomes available. Write down the claim number and any other instructions the claims representative, and your agent give you for the accident.



After more than 30 years as a professional artist, the 51- year-old still finds great enthusiasm in painting, believing that "a good place to paint is wherever I can."

A previous exhibitor at the Festival of the Arts, this is Pierre's second win in the MKAF Poster Art Contest. He first won in 2019, but severe weather hindered the Festival that year.

Dugas Pavilion green in Destin.


