Honoring Our Heroes: Okaloosa County Wreaths Across America

On Saturday, December 14, 2024, the Beal Cemetery, Gulf Cemetery, Heritage Gardens, Destin Memorial Cemetery and Sunset Cemetery will join more than 3,000 cemeteries nationwide for the annual Wreaths Across America Ceremony. These local events are more than just part of a national program; for many in Okaloosa County, they are deeply personal and significant. The ceremonies include nationally coordinated moments of silence, followed by laying wreaths on veterans' graves as a simple gesture of gratitude.

While many are familiar with the wreaths program at Arlington National Cemetery, communities throughout America also participate in this solemn tradition. Here in Okaloosa County, Wreaths Across America is a community effort that honors our local veterans and ensures their sacrifices are remembered and never forgotten.



Local volunteers play a crucial role in making this event possible. In **Fort Walton Beach**, Tom Rice, owner of Magnolia Grill, is a key figure in the Wreaths Across America event. Rice has been instrumental in bringing this event to Beal Memorial Cemetery. He shares that their target goal for wreaths increases annually, with just over 2,000 wreaths expected to be laid at Beal this December. "This year marks the sixth year that veterans buried at Beal Memorial Cemetery will receive wreaths," Rice explains. "There's never a day that goes by without a blue tent being raised for a veteran laid to rest at Beal Cemetery. No matter when or where they served, they need to be honored, and that's the goal."

The Beal Memorial Cemetery ceremony is a meaningful event showcasing the collaboration between the community and local businesses. Tom Rice highlights the importance of this collective effort: "It takes a community effort." For instance, the City Produce Company helps by keeping the wreaths in cold storage, and Step One Automotive staff delivers them to the cemetery the day before placement. Last year, nearly 300 volunteers participated, and Rice notes that support continues to grow, with more people stepping up each year. The logistics coordinator, Retired CMSgt Dennis Krebs, expertly manages the staging of volunteers, serves as the NCOIC for Placement Day, and oversees the post-Christmas cleanup of the wreaths at the cemetery.

The 30-minute ceremony will feature remarks by Brigadier General Mark A. Massaro, 96th Test Wing Commander, and the unveil-

ing of wreaths for each military branch, including a new wreath for the Space Force. Wreaths will also be placed in honor of POW/MIA veterans and Gold Star families. Among the attendees will be State Representative Patt Maney, a retired judge and Army Brigadier General, who will raise the Gold Star wreath. Tom Rice, who served as Maney's First Sergeant in the Army, reflects on the deep meaning of these ceremonies, adding that "honoring all military services is essential."

"When the wreath is placed," Rice explains, "the individual performing the placement either gives a hand salute if they served in the military or places their hand over their heart if they did not. It's a powerful moment of respect." With each veteran's wreath placed by a volunteer, he or she is asked to "say

their name" to ensure that the legacy of duty, service, and sacrifice is never forgotten.

This year also marks the 10th anniversary of the casting of the Veterans Tribute Bell, which will be rung as part of the ceremony. The bell, housed in the Veterans Tribute Tower, further symbolizes the community's dedication to honoring veterans.

Dora Carrano, who helps coordinate the local Wreaths Across America efforts in Niceville and Valparaiso, brings a unique, personal perspective. She comes from a multi-generational military family. "This has given me a deep appreciation for the military, our service members and the sacrifices they make. Bringing Wreaths Across America to our area gives me and others within the community the opportunity to honor our local veterans, their service and their sacrifice."

Therese Baker and her son Gaige are dedicated volun-

teers at the Heritage Gardens in Niceville and Sunset Cemetery in Valparaiso. Their participation is not just about the wreaths; it's about honoring the memory of loved ones like Dave, Therese's late husband, and others throughout America who have served. "People often hear about the large ceremonies at national cemeteries, but aren't aware that communities do this locally as well," Therese shared. "Gaige and I do it to honor Dave and those like him who served for us." Wreaths are \$17 and 1,500 graves need sponsorship. You can join the joint ceremony for both Heritage Gardens and Sunset Cemetery on Dec. 14 at 11 a.m. at Heritage Gardens Funeral Home-Cemetery. In **Destin**, the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 296 and community volunteers will place wreaths at every veteran's grave in both the Destin Memorial and Marler cemeteries. Cassandra Wohlin: Having Babies for Those Who Can't

Cassie is Office Coordinator for Fort Walton Beach Chiropractic. Growing up, her only ambition was to have babies and be a mom. She says her own mother was great and looked up to her for taking in babies and kids into their home. Her parents took in many kids over the years and some of them still call her parents mom and dad.

Cassie met her husband when she was age 15 and they married when she was 17. Her husband had a daughter age 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ when they started dating. She was 5 when they married. Cassie was stepmom at 17. She and her husband wanted to wait five years before having their own children. They had their first daughter year five and 15 months later, had their second daughter. They wanted them to be close together.

From Kansas originally, Cassie moved to Okaloosa County in 2016. Her husband was from here and she loves it. She hates the cold. Together, they fostered



14 kids over four years. Cassie met another foster mom who was a surrogate.

Wanting to be a surrogate for others, Cassie learned you can't be a surrogate until you have had your own biological children. She contacted Creative Family Connections in Maryland to explore surrogacy. Cassie liked the process of pregnancy and wanted to help people have children of their own.

There are rules, such as you can't be in financial need, your credit has to be good and you have to be in good health. Cassie had to submit medical and financial records. The application is a robust screening process. Cassie likens it to a dating profile. There are a lot of questions such as, who you are willing to carry a baby for? For example, are you willing to carry for singles or homosexuals? Are you open to having a continuing relationship with the parents and child?

Cassie and her husband answered yes to these questions. She did choose to have one embryo at a time. Otherwise she might be having twins or triplets. Some women have five embryos transferred at a time, because maybe only one will develop and In Vitro Fertilization (IVF) is expensive.

Two gay men from Denmark wanted to have children of their own. The laws were different in their own country, so they came to the United States. Each of them supplied sperm and utilized an egg donor to create the embryos. Gestational carriers have full embryos transferred. Cassie was their surrogate. She gave birth twice to sisters for the couple. The sisters are three and five now.

Then a family friend contacted Cassie to be a surrogate. This one was a two-and-a-half year process. There were complications and Cassie had to have an emergency C-Section. Cassie had already decided she would be done with having babies at number five. Surrogate agencies have different rules, but there used to be a rule that you could only have five natural births.

Cassie and her husband had made the decision to start having children young so they could go on their own adventures before retirement age. In fact, they are planning a European trip and will visit the two gentlemen and their surrogate sisters while traveling.

When asked if there was any difficulty in giving birth and then letting the surrogate babies go away, Cassie says no. There is no emotional attachment. She has no regrets and even knowing



the difficulty she went through with the last pregnancy, would do it all again. While there is a financial benefit to surrogacy, she says it is heartwarming to see parents with their children. It is a giving experience and Cassie says there is a need for surrogates.



The County Commission has been able to leverage money collected with grants on a state and federal level to enhance our area roads, public safety and storm water program. These projects offer amenities that we would not have been able to accomplish for years otherwise.


Completed:

• Widening of P.J. Adams Parkway from SR 85 to Crab Apple Dr.

Stabilized more than 50 miles of dirt roads with lime rocks.

• Resurfaced over 13 miles of roadway and stabilized all previous cold-mix stabilized roads with in-house paving staff.

• Bluewater Bay Hazard Mitigation project



Ongoing Projects of Major Note:

• SW Crestview Bypass: Anticipated completion in fiscal year 25 to provide access from Antioch Rd. to SR 85 and a connection between this new roadway and Hwy 90. This will ultimately provide a direct connection to I-10 as FDOT continues the construction of the new interchange.

· West 98 Parallel Collector Rd.: Intended to improve traffic congestion on west 98 in the vicinity of Hurlburt Field. This is a collaborative effort between the County, Eglin AFB and FDOT to reduce the need for access to uncontrolled intersections along U.S. 98 and to divert traffic to controlled intersections.

• Bridge to Bridge Multiuse Path: Under construction and to be completed in fiscal year 25. This project provides a safe pathway for pedestrians and bicyclists adjacent to U.S. 98 from the Brooks Bridge to



the Destin Bridge *

• Widening, resurfacing, and bridge improvements to HWY 2: Safety widening of travel lanes from 10.5' to 12', reconstruction of the roadway base and travel surface, and rehabilitation of the Yellow River Bridge.

• Construction of the South Ag Extension Building: Construction of a nearly 3,000 s.f. facility (located adjacent to the South Farmer's Market) that will be used for the education, growth and development of agricultural services in Okaloosa County and scheduled to open in fiscal year '25.

• Completion of all dirt road stabilization with lime rock and continued capping with asphalt

to reduce erosion impacts and improve access/safety of roadways.

• Santa Rosa Blvd. Improvements: Project is advancing past the 60% design level with a large focus on utility coordination and implementation of storm water improvements. Access to parcels and a safe pedestrian/multi-use path are incorporated into the design and moving forward to future construction.

Other Efforts/Projects:

• Collected and processed over 1M pounds of Household Hazardous Waste

• Maintained over 1,000 miles of county-maintained roadways/rights-of-way and 297 storm water management areas

• Mosquito control services for over 530,000 acres of land

Coordination with FDOT on Brooks Bridge Reconstruction, SR 85 improvements (widening from Shoal River to P.J. Adams Parkway), and I-10 interchange

• Live Oak Church Road, John King Rd., and P.J. Adams Parkway intersection improve-



ments with SR 85 • Veterans Park and Living Shoreline Improvements





Simplifying Medicare Advantage

vs. Supplement Choices

This is the time of year when you should review your Medicare options and make important decisions about your coverage for 2025.

Right now, we are in the Annual Election Period (AEP) for all Medicare beneficiaries. It is often referred to as the Annual Open Enrollment Period. This annual event runs from October 15th through December 7th.

Because this period allows

ALL Medicare eligible folks to make switches and changes to their plans, it is the most heavily advertised time of the year-not like I have to tell you that! Folks on Original Medicare (Parts A&B), Supplements (MediGap), Stand Alone Prescription Plans (Part D) and Advantage Plans have a chance to pretty much do anything they want with their coverage mix. The hard part comes with sorting it all out.

One of the things I often talk about with Medicare beneficiaries around this time of year is to make sure you don't get so overwhelmed by all the information out there that you run out of time to take action. It can sometimes become "paralysis by analysis" syndrome. Remember, the AEP ends on December 7th!

Heritage Museum of Northwest Florida in 2025: the Vietnam Refugee Camp at Eglin AFB.

The new exhibit hall will house photos, newspaper reproductions, artifacts and oral histories to highlight the three phases of this project that resettled

Vietnam FAC's Reminisce During Final Reunion

Nearly 70 years ago, Vietnam-era forward air controllers arrived at Hurlburt Field to train how to coordinate air-to-ground strikes ahead of shipping out for the Vietnam War.

This month, those same Airmen returned for a final reunion with a ceremony held at the Memorial Air Park on Hurlburt Field, Oct. 26, 2024.

Base leadership welcomed Forward Air Controller Association members as they reconnected and shared past experiences while paying their respects to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. "We're excited to welcome you back and pay homage to the legacy you have set for every Air Commando following you," said Chief Master Sgt. Ralph Oliver, 1st Special Operations Wing command chief. "Thank you for your service and thank you for lighting the way."

Established in 1999, the FACA is a non-profit organization whose purpose is to preserve the history of the personnel who supported and flew the forward air controller mission during the war in Southeast



Asia and serves as a collective point to share their stories and continue their legacy.

As members honored and remembered their fallen wingmen, the significance of it being the final reunion remained at the forefront. "This will be a very fitting end, both a good and sad one, as we hold our last reunion where it all started," said retired Lt. Col. Claude Newland, the FACA reunion coordinator. "Our time has come as we are aging and eventually every 'last-man standing' organization must fold its tent." During the memorial ceremony portion of the reunion, retired Capt. Evan Quiros, presented a "Ghost Pilot" statue to Lt. Gen. Michael Conley, the commander of the Air Force Special Operations Command.

Sculpted by Quiros, the bronze statue is roughly a lifesized bust of a pilot wearing a helmet. The visor on the helmet is polished to give a ghost-like impression to represent those who have lost their lives, Quiros added. Engraved at the base of the statue is a poem by John Gillespie McGee, "For the pilots who 'slipped the surly bonds of Earth and danced the skies on laughter-silver wings' but never returned."

The design of the sculpture transformed over the years as Quiros experienced life's tragedies. "I lost my daughter, her husband and my two grandkids in a plane crash in Colorado," Quiros said. "After mourning them and those I lost during the war, the sculpture evolved and my hope was for it to force people to reflect on the people in their own lives."

How the Federal Reserve Impacts Mortgage Rates: What Homebuyers Should Know

any time soon.

While Fed policies have a big impact, mortgage rates are also influenced by several other factors like inflation, supply and demand, the bond market, and employment and economic data. Higher inflation typically pushes mortgage rates up, as lenders adjust for decreased purchasing power over time. 



What to Expect from Oxygen Therapy

As most of us likely learned in grade school, oxygen is vital for the survival of most living organisms. Oxygen is essential as cells cannot produce the energy needed to perform basic functions such as movement, thinking and digestion without it. But what happens when the simple act of breathing becomes too difficult? Unfortunately, this is a reality for an estimated 1.5 million people in the United States. The cause of breathlessness varies from person to person, but can be contributed to a variety of disorders including asthma, COPD, emphysema, lung disease and more. In many of these cases, the patient's doctor will prescribe oxygen therapy.

According to the American Lung Association, oxygen therapy can help decrease shortness of breath. Each type of oxygen delivery device has a setting or an 'oxygen flow rate," which is the number of liters of oxygen flowing per minute (this is set by your doctor and should not be changed without the consent of a healthcare professional). Home oxygen concentrators are large units that are kept relatively stationary in your home. These devices convert room air into pure oxygen by removing nitrogen and other gasses. A portable oxygen concentrator works similarly, but is much smaller and more portable. It is ideal for a traveler or for a patient with an active lifestyle. Compressed oxygen in a metal tank is a common oxygen delivery device. The tanks come in different sizes, but the smaller the tank, the less oxygen is in it. Gauges on the tank are used to control the flow rate. Face masks and nasal cannulas are most commonly used to deliver the oxygen to the patient through their nose or mouth.

There are some considerations to take into account when using oxygen therapy. For example, special care must be exercised storing oxygen as it must be away from heat, and tanks must be stored upright. Additionally, access to electricity will be imperative for an oxygen user. So, power outages need to be carefully addressed in areas that experience severe weather. Using petroleum-based products can also pose a danger to an oxygen patient as the interaction can cause skin irritation or burns.

Matthew Perry's Death and the Spotlight on Ketamine Therapy for Brain Health

Matthew Perry's untimely death brought the therapeutic use of ketamine for brain health issues into the public spotlight. Let's take a closer look at ketamine—what it is, its history and methods of administration.

finding little evidence to support the theory that depression is caused by a lack of serotonin, dopamine or norepinephrine. In fact, SSRIs are effective in only about 40% of the people who take them. In contrast, ketamine shows an 80-85% efficacy rate in treating mood disorders and chronic pain.

Over the past 10-15 years, more than 2,000 papers have been published on ketamine's potential to help with treatment-resistant mood disorders. Researchers have found that ketamine can begin to relieve symptoms of depression immediately after the first treatment. Longterm relief, however, stems from neuroplasticity. When patients complete six ketamine treatments over a two – three-week period, the drug helps rewire neural circuits, leading to sustained positive mood changes. Additionally, ketamine binds to receptors in the opioid pathway, providing relief from chronic inflammatory pain.

Methods of Ketamine Administration and Side Effects

Ketamine can be administered in four ways: sublingually, via nasal spray, intramuscular injection or IV infusion. All methods come with three possible side effects: nausea, elevated blood pressure and the potential for a negative psychedelic experience.

Tragically, he died from an overdose.

Happy Thanksgiving! The season is about to officially start. In lieu of our to do list growing, our calendar filling up with gatherings, or the all too quiet solitude for those without family, be sure to schedule in a massage or two. Reaping the benefits of a good massage can make this season more fruitful in many ways.

Many consider massage a

treat. It helps us to relax and we feel pampered and calm afterward. Recently, however, health professionals are viewing it as an important tool in promoting mental and physical well-being.

Massage consists of pressing, rubbing or manipulating the skin, muscles, tendons and ligaments to produce certain results. There are 12 main types:

Swedish - soft tissue (Research shows less muscle and point pain as well as lower heart rates, blood pressure and anxiety levels.)

Deep Tissue - deep layers and intense pressure. (I had several of these years ago. He taught me how to scream to release the pain as he worked my shoulder. I was bruised after the treatments but I have not had that specific issue with my shoulder since. It was so worth it.)

Hot Stone - improved blood

flow and reduced muscle tension

Sports - focus is on specific muscles used most frequently in one's sport or for those who exercise frequently. Can reduce muscle soreness.

Shiatsu - Japanese massage based on traditional Chinese medicine and involves using acupressure (These are acupuncture points.) Recent studies showed benefits for children and teens with autism spectrum disorders (reduces aggressive behavior, relieves trauma symptoms and improves focus).

Thai Massage - combination of acupressure and yoga. This is an active form of massage with several benefits such as lowering back pain, improving the immune system and flexibility.

Prenatal - focuses on issues related to pregnancy (It's not recommended during the first



trimester.)

How Massage Can Benefit Us

Craniosacral Therapy sacral massage or cranial osteopathy. Aids in neck, back and pelvic issues.

Reflexology - developed in ancient Egypt, China and India. It can also be called regional or zone therapy. It's performed on the feet and hands using acupressure points. (Can reduce symptoms associated with multiple sclerosis.)

Lymphatic Drainage rhythmic light touch with tapping and circular strokes. The lymph system plays a critical role in immune system processes. Its benefits include lowering lymphedema, one's 02 saturation, lowering your blood pressure and heart rate and promotes wound healing.

Aromatherapy - Use of essential oils with massage

Chakra Balancing - (Reiki Energy) Japanese treatment involving light touch or holding hands just over the body to manipulate energy. (Chakras stem from Ayurvedic medicine in India.) There are 7 body chakras: Crown, 3rd eye, throat, heart,

solar plexus, sacral, root.

The physical benefits of massage include improved circulation, decreased muscle stiffness, less joint inflammation, improved quality of sleep, quicker recovery between workouts, improved flexibility, less pain and soreness, strengthened immune system.

Mental benefits include reduction in stress levels, greater relaxation, improved moods, less anxiety, more energy and an improved sense of wellness.


Many of these benefits can be found in several modalities such as relaxation, improved moods and lower anxiety levels. Be sure to ask questions when looking for a specialist. Tis' the Season to Protect Your Treasures

and gifted to loved ones to smile, ooh and ah over. Rings and earrings, bracelets and necklaces, Oh My! So, once you have these beautiful gems, gold and silver, too, how do you insure these beautiful treasures?

There are two ways to insure your new valuables. One is to schedule your new jewelry onto your existing home insurance policy for its specifically appraised value. It will be necessary for you to have the item or set appraised by a licensed or certified jewelry appraiser prior to insuring them. Many insurance companies allow appraisals up to 36 months old, while some require new appraisals every 12 months. Please review the terms of your policy to find out what the rules require.

The other way to insure your valuables is on an Inland Marine Floater policy. These policies typically cover for the perils of theft, breakage or mysterious disappearance, but are not tied to your home insurance.

One advantage of having an Inland Marine Floater policy over scheduling on your home insurance is that, if there is a claim, it won't count against your home insurance policy itself. It will still count as a claim, but not the same way.

There are 12 categories of personal property that are typically classified as Scheduled Items:

The rating basis of the item or items in question has to do with the current value of the item or set, where it is kept, either in the home or in a safe, as well as the condition of the item.

In the event of loss by theft or mysterious disappearance, there would need to be a police report filed as well as the claim itself.

Many carriers offer discounts for the scheduling multiple items on one policy. For example, if you have a 10K ring and your husband has a Rolex, scheduling them together under one policy would reduce the premiums for both, as it would make more sense than to have a separate policy for each item.

For any older yet still valuable items that fall into this category, please make sure to keep

appraisals current to get full value in the event of a claim. If your last appraisal showed a value of 15K, but the current value is 20K, you will not be able to collect on the difference, if you have an old appraisal that is outside the bounds of the underwriting guidelines.

You may also add other items to the same policy such as rare books, antique firearms or other valuable items from the list, provided they have been appraised within the timeframe of the carrier's rules, usually either 12 months, or sometimes up to 36 months, depending on the carrier.

Your treasures carry more than monetary value; to you they would mean the world. So, protecting them to the fullest extent possible is a logical next step, and will be much less expensive than you think.

It's a good idea to sit down with your Independent Insurance Agent to talk about your options, and outline a good plan to protect your treasures in a way that makes you feel comfortable.

the campus after seven o'clock to attend my last class of the semester. My last college class. Ever. It was a night class.

In America, most self-respecting people my age were finishing supper, settling down to watch "Wheel of Fortune." But I was in school.

I had been attending community college for 11 years. I had been taking a lot of night courses. Which meant that I had perfected the art of eating supper in my truck, on the way to class. I drove with my knees, ate with my hands, and controlled the radio with my big toe.

Supper often consisted of foil-wrapped tamales, purchased from Carmela, a middle-aged Mexican woman who visited our construction jobsites. Carmela traveled in a battered '84 Nissan Maxima that looked like a roving salvage yard.

Every time I'd buy a tamale, Carmela would pat my cheek and say, "Joo are very sweet boy, but joo need a bath, joo smell like goat butt."

So parked my truck. I rushed into class, smelling like the fundaments of a horned barnyard animal.

Eleven years it had taken me to finish school. Me. A middle-school dropout. My formal education ended in seventh grade, after my father took his own life with a hunting rifle. I simply quit going to school. I was a rural child. It wasn't a big deal. Nobody seemed to care what rural dropouts did.

I got my first job hanging drywall at age 14. I started working in bars, playing music shortly thereafter. I had a lot of jobs. I hung gutter. I worked as an ice-cream-scoop. I was a telemarketer. I was a nobody. I was white trash.

Until I enrolled in community college.

I enrolled as an adult, and my life changed. I became alumni at Okaloosa-Walton Community College.

I completed high-school equivalency courses. I finished the collegiate coursework. It took me eleven years. I worked hard. And I count every year I spent at OWCC as a blessing.

I don't care what you've heard, community college is the beating heart of America. Your big, fancy schools are well and good. But show me a community college, and I'll show you the vascular system of this nation.

America is not built on the shoulders of Harvard or Yale graduates. America's internal organs are made up of men and women who know the difference between good and bad tamales.

That night, our classroom consisted of a commercial plumber, an electrician's assistant, a few GIs, and a Hooters waitress who looked as though she had come directly from work. And me, a degenerate bar musician/tile-layer.

Our literature teacher arrived. Soon, we were discussing what was known to our class as "TKAM." "To Kill a Mockingbird." And everyone in our classroom had something to say about TKAM.

Namely, because this book was not just literature to us. It was a taste of home. The book took place in Monroe County, Alabama. We were one-pointfive counties away from Monroe County.

We all talked about deeper meanings within the book. We spoke of metaphors and hyperboles and allegories and a bunch of other five-dollar words nobody understood except the Hooters waitress. And it was a great night.

And when class was finished, our teacher got this tear-stained look in her eyes and said, "I'm going to miss you all."

She said, "A few of you are going to graduate this year, and I wanted to do something special for you to mark this occasion."

She invited the graduates to the front of the room. We all shyly walked forward. She gave

us tiny potted begonias and greeting cards. She kissed our foreheads.

They don't kiss your foreheads at Yale.

The Hooters waitress and I stood shoulder to shoulder. The teacher made a big deal about how we were all such important people. She told the Hooters waitress that she was going to be a big-time nurse someday. The waitress blushed.

Then the professor told the classroom that she believed I would become a writer one day. I wanted to bury my face from embarrassment.

But the old woman touched my cheek and said, "You are so beautiful, Sean. I know God is going to use your past to make a marvelous future." Then she kissed my forehead again.

If there was a dry eye in the classroom it belonged to a sewing needle.

And anyway, this goat butt will forever be a proud community college graduate.
