May you receive God's perfect gift this Christmas!



Experience A Live Nativity This Season

The birth of Christ is the main focus, but come to learn about the full salvation story from the miraculous birth, to the cross, to the resurrection.

The 36th Annual Live Nativity at First Baptist Church of Fort Walton Beach—a free gift to the city and the surrounding communities—is open nightly from 6 to 8:30 p.m. Friday, December 13th through Friday, December 20th. Located next to the First Baptist Church sanctuary at the corner of 2nd and Church Street. there is ample, free parking in the church's parking lot located just across the street from the Live Nativity.

The nativity scene includes

Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus as well as the three Wise Men and Angels. Enter the nativity, have a photo taken and then depart to the Shepherd's Field. Your nativity picture is printed immediately and you can pick up your photo as you depart the event.

As you enter the Shepherd's Field, you're provided handheld feeding trays to feed the animals without putting your fingers at risk! All shepherds have buckets of sweet feed and carrots that they pass out to those who wish to feed the animals.

In the Shepherd's Field there are sheep, miniature donkeys and for the first time, two camels to pet and feed. Naomi the camel, who has been a fixture at the Live Nativity for over a decade, had a baby boy—Nicodemus, or Nico for short. Middle school age shepherds are super-duper scoopers who make sure the Shepherd's Field is safe to walk about during the Live Nativity!

As you leave the Shepherd's Field, you're greeted by a Roman Guard at the cross and directed toward the Empty Tomb where an Angel asks: "Why do you seek him here? He is Risen." You'll then pass the Candy Cane booth where children receive a candy cane and hear the story about its invention. The Deacon's table with free Bibles



is next and then you can also listen to seasonal, inspirational songs presented by the music department of the church as you partake of cookies, hot chocolate or coffee around one of the warm fire pits.

The Live Nativity is a no cost, no donation event. It is a fun time for both the costumed volunteers and guests as church



members interact with the community and show the Love of Jesus as His birth is celebrated! We hope to see you there!







Okaloosa County Receives \$750,000 Grant to Combat Coastal Erosion Along Hwy. 98

A critical stretch of Highway 98 on Okaloosa Island faces severe erosion threats, with over 4 acres of shoreline lost since 2010. The county secured federal funding to design natural barriers against what experts identify as a significant risk to infrastructure and military operations.

Okaloosa County has been awarded \$750,000 from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to begin planning a natural defense against worsening coastal erosion that threatens

one of northwest Florida's vital transportation corridors.

The grant will fund site assessments and preliminary design work for a 4,500-foot living shoreline along Highway 98 on Okaloosa Island, where the road comes within 20 feet of Choctawhatchee Bay in some areas.

"The living shoreline project is a proactive approach to address the coastal erosion issue while simultaneously providing multiple benefits to the ecosystem, community, and military," said Michael Norberg, Okaloosa County's Coastal Resource Manager. "By stabilizing the shoreline, we not only help protect the adjacent roadway but also create valuable habitat for a variety of species, enhance coastal resilience, and offer new recreational opportunities for residents and visitors alike."

The project represents a collaborative effort between Okaloosa County, Eglin Air Force Base, and The Nature Conservancy. Unlike traditional hardened infrastructure such as concrete seawalls, the design will incorporate natural elements like limestone breakwaters and native vegetation to stabilize the shoreline while creating marine habitat.

The need for shoreline protection became evident after Hurricane Dennis in 2005 caused significant damage to the roadway, resulting in extended lane closures and requiring nearly \$19 million in repairs and improvements.

According to Norberg, the situation has grown more urgent as coastal erosion accelerates, threatening both the roadway and underground infrastructure, including fiber-optic communication lines used by both military and civilian entities.

The stretch of Highway 98 serves more than 43,300 vehicles daily and ranks in the 91st percentile of busiest roads in the county. It's vital for military operations at Eglin and Hurlburt Air Force Bases, hurricane evacuation, and regional commerce. Without this connector, traffic would need to reroute more than 30 miles around the bay, adding nearly an hour to travel times.

The project aims to create more than 1.5 acres of intertidal reef habitat and 6.2 acres of protected seagrass recruitment area. It will also enhance 0.85 miles of native vegetated coastal habitat, including protection for an established nesting location for state-threatened shore birds.

The project also aims to boost tourism opportunities along the shoreline. Tourism plays a vital role in Okaloosa County's economy, with eco-tourism alone generating \$734 million in direct spending in 2023.

The living shoreline project, supported by \$100,000 in Tourist Development Department matching funds, will support fisheries through habitat creation and enhancement as well as provide a unique snorkel opportunity along the reef breakwater structures.

"The need to expedite im-

plementation was highlighted following the 2024 hurricane season in Florida," said Michael Norberg, Okaloosa County's Coastal Resource Manager. "Although Hurricane Helene made landfall more than 150 miles to the east, the northerly winds we experienced over a three- or four-day period resulted in the loss of more than four feet of shoreline in some parts of the project area."

Norberg's monitoring efforts have documented ongoing erosion over the years, which he attributes to strong seasonal winds from the north-northeast during the fall and winter months.

"We're still awaiting some additional grant funding that will allow us to expand this initial phase, effectively 'skipping' another grant cycle, if awarded," said Norberg. "This additional funding would take the initial phase of site analysis and preliminary design and allow us to move directly into final design and permitting."

The grant is part of NFWF's 2024 National Coastal Resilience Fund, which awarded \$139 million across 94 projects nationwide. The projects leveraged an additional \$141 million in matching contributions for a total conservation impact of \$280 million. Once design work is complete, the county plans to seek additional grant funding for construction of the living shoreline.

The project has garnered support from multiple organizations including the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Emerald Coast Regional Council, and the Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance.

Fort Walton Beach Expands Pickleball Presence with 5 New Courts at Ferry Park The City of Fort Walton

The City of Fort Walton Beach opened five new pickleball courts at Ferry Park on Friday, adding to its growing network of 21 outdoor courts across the city.

The City of Fort Walton Beach expanded its recreational offerings Friday with the opening of five new pickleball courts at Ferry Park, bringing the city's total to 21 outdoor courts.

City Manager Jeff Peters, speaking at the newly constructed courts, said the project was approved in the past budget year and completed by city work crews.

"Our Public Works and Parks crews did a ton of great work here," Peters said. The courts, which match the color scheme of nearby tennis facilities, opened at noon on Friday.

Additional amenities, including court lighting, vending machines, and sidewalks, will be installed within the next two weeks, according to Peters.

The new Ferry Park courts



join existing facilities across the city, including six courts at Mooney, six at Jet Drive and Holmes Boulevard, and four at the tennis center.

Looking ahead, Peters touched plans for a major expansion at the new athletic complex on Hollywood Boulevard. The project, which will soon go out for bid, includes plans for a 13-court pickleball complex featuring a stadium court with bleachers and eight covered courts, along with expanded parking facilities.

"Obviously pickleball is a growing sport nationwide, worldwide," Peters said. "We're just happy to be a part of it and try to be the leader in the community with new recreation amenities like this."

Jerry Williams: The American Dream & the Very Human Experience

Jerry Williams retired as the highly respected and successful President/CEO of Eglin Federal Credit Union (EFCU) and moved back into his newly remodeled home four weeks prior to this interview. He and his wife, Jean, feel like they have a new home. It even has that "new house smell." They love their Poquito Bayou neighborhood, knowing their neighbors, and walking their rescue dogs. Jerry and Jean have been married 21 years.

Jerry was born in Crestview. His dad was a farm boy from Baker and his mother a city girl from Bloomington, Ind. Jerry's Army vet dad and his mother met in Indiana. They married and moved to Baker. It turned out "Green Acres" was not the place to be, for her, and they moved to Fort Walton Beach when Jerry was age six.

After attending local elementary and high schools, he attended OWJC and UWF, earning a degree in mathematics. His dad was an air conditioning mechanic on Eglin AFB and Jerry credits learning his blue-collar work ethic and trouble-shooting skills from him. He credits his people skills to his mother. A real mix of the two people.

After he graduated high school, his mom and dad took a contract labor job to clean the EFCU building on Eglin AFB at night. While attending OWJC, Jerry cleaned the Hurlburt location at night to pay for school.

He went on to be engineer support for Pratt & Whitney Aircraft in West Palm Beach. In Jerry's words, he was a geek who applied mathematical formulas to the engineer's work. He was then offered a job at a small defense contractor developing the AMRAAM missile seeker at Eglin, AFB.

Bill Webster, president of a small company in Fort Walton Beach, lured Jerry away from the defense industry. They moved to Memphis where Bill



started a company developing software for credit unions. EFCU was their largest client. Bill eventually sold his company and moved back to Fort Walton Beach. While Jerry was in Memphis, Jim Appleton, president of EFCU, called and offered him the position of Vice President of Data Processing. He moved back to Fort Walton Beach in 1994.

He held various IT positions

over 20 years. During this time, he met his wife Jean who was Bill Webster's sister. She was working at Bank of America.

Thinking about the future and the idea he may be considered for president one day, he decided it was time to "quit being a nerd" and get out of the computer room. Jerry joined

co-worker Sherry Harlow at FWB Chamber events. He talks glowingly about chairing the Military Affairs Committee, being an Honorary Commander at Hurlburt Field, and being an Eglin 33rd Fighter Wing Civic leader. These associations gave him deep appreciation and knowledge about military bases in our community and opened many doors.

In 2014, he was made presi-

dent of EFCU. He was invited to numerous events and felt he was invited because of the person he was, not the position he held. He retired after 30 years of service to EFCU. Jerry knows there will less invitations coming his way. Still passionate about being involved in the community, he told his co-worker Neko Stubblefield, he still makes a great "+1."

When asked how he created the enthusiastic culture at EFCU, as demonstrated by the large turnout of employees at events and their contagious excitement, Jerry says the more involved he was, the more involved his employees were. Leading by example, he told the team he would "be at the front of the band leading the charge." He also worked to make sure there were resources to support community involvement. EFCU eventually joined at the highest membership levels at all cham-

bers with his board's support. He and Jean enjoyed traveling to conferences and being involved in the community. They discovered they enjoyed bike riding together. They recently completed a six-day, 171-mile ride along the shores of Lake Michigan.

Retirement holds challenges for Jerry and Jean. He has been diagnosed with Genetic Ataxia, a general term for diminished motor skills. There are 75-100 variations, but it basically means a faulty protein is causing the cerebellum to die. He has Spinocerebellar ataxia type 6 (SCA6). The blessing about this variation is, it is late onset and slow progression.

The symptoms start with awkwardness and progress to fumbling and falling. Walking on uneven terrain or stairs is very difficult. His progression will involve using a cane, a walker and then a wheel chair. Talking and eating will be affected. He and Jean have remodeled their home to be accessible, no matter what happens.

Jerry wasn't born with a quit-

ter gene. If he falls down, he gets up. He will minimize the effect and maximize what he can do. In the past, he's been scuba diving and sky diving. At 57 he competed in an Ironman triathlon. He can't run now, but can still bike and swim. He uses a recumbent mountain bike and magnetic shoes and pedals. There is a Multiple Sclerosis medication that is showing some promise and there will be decisions about whether he should



Simplifying Medicare Advantage vs. Supplement Choices

This is the time of year when you should review your Medicare options and make important decisions about your coverage for 2025.

Right now, we are in the Annual Election Period (AEP) for all Medicare beneficiaries. It is often referred to as the Annual Open Enrollment Period. This

Because this period allows ALL Medicare eligible folks to make switches and changes to their plans, it is the most heavily advertised time of the year—not like I have to tell you that! Folks on Original Medicare (Parts A&B), Supplements (MediGap), Stand Alone Prescription Plans (Part D) and Advantage Plans have a chance to pretty much do anything they want with their coverage mix. The hard part comes with sorting it all out.

One of the things I often talk about with Medicare beneficiaries around this time of year is to make sure you don't get so overwhelmed by all the information out there that you run out of time to take action. It can sometimes become "paralysis by analysis" syndrome. Remember, the AEP ends on December 7th!

Since Medicare Advantage Plans are offered by private companies, one excellent feature is they have more freedom and motivation to include extra benefits such as vision, hearing, gym memberships, dental, overthe-counter pharmacy items and more.

However, it is important to note that, not only do Medicare Advantage plans vary by state, but are different right down to each individual county in each state. Supplements are universal regardless of state/county, but often times cost more premium per month and do not cover prescriptions, requiring additional premium costs to pick up that coverage.

Your sibling in North Dakota is not going to have the same insurance company/coverage options you would in your Florida county. Try not to get trapped into believing the terms Supplement and Advantage are the same. It is critical to know your specific differences before making choice that works for you.



5 Tips to Lower Your Insurance Costs in a Rough Market

1. Update your home. In this property insurance market, most of the standard carriers are imposing strict age guide-

lines on Roof, Heating, Wiring, and Plumbing. If your home is 20 years old or older, keep in mind that the older your roof is, the harder it will be to move your insurance to a different carrier. The same holds

true for your hot water heater, which most carriers regard as too old once it has been in your home for at least 15 years.

2. Confirm with your agent that your insurance has all applicable discounts. Wind Mitigation discounts weigh heavily on your premium. Roof credits such as FBC, or Florida Building Code Equivalent, Hip roof, for roofs that slope on all four sides like a pyramid, and single wraps, may vastly decrease your premium from what it is now. If you have recently replaced your roof, it is best to order a new mitigation inspection directly afterwards, and submit it to your agent. Carriers acknowledge new inspections as of the date they are received by the underwriting department, rather than the date they are performed.

3. Check your Total Insurable Replacement Cost. Ask your agent to update your replacement cost estimator. Most standard carriers have some form of inflation guard on their policies, which is designed to keep your dwelling coverage at or above the level required in order to fulfill the Florida Valued Policy Law. Due to the recent burst of inflation in materials and the costs of hiring a licensed contractor, some policies may experience a bigger jump in dwelling coverage from policy term to policy term. It is best to check with your agent to be sure your home is not over-insured.

4. Smart Water Protec-tion System. Some newer homes have a Smart Water Protection system which automatically shuts off the water in the event of accidental leakage, and many carriers offer a good discount to policyholders for hav-




ing this device installed in their homes.

5. Increase Deductibles. This is a valid way to reduce your overall property insurance premium. However, there is a downside. For one thing, if raising your deductible significantly increases your potential out of pocket expenses in the event of a claim, you have to decide if you are prepared for that risk. Secondly, some deductibles can only be changed at renewal. If you change your wind deductible from 2% to 5%, you will have to wait another year before changing it back, so be sure to calculate your potential out of pocket exposure before making this decision.

In this rough market, it is difficult to shop rates between carriers, but the best time to do that is after hurricane season ends, which is in December.

The guidelines are always the toughest in high summer, so that by December, many of the carriers have relaxed their rules enough for people to move from carrier to carrier with much less fuss and expense, and that, dear reader, is what we all want peace of mind with less expense.

'Tis The Season of Gratitude

Our Founding Fathers gave us a form of government that has withstood wars, financial crises, weak presidents and difficulties with the legislative and judicial branches. We have just witnessed our constitutional process in action. The power of the citizen's vote. Our Democracy in a Republic has been messy from the beginning. As George Washington, then the commander of the Continental Army, said in his Farewell Orders to his army on November 2, 1783:

"Who, that was not a witness to the Revolutionary War, could imagine that men who came from the different parts of the continent, strongly disposed to despise and quarrel with each other, would instantly become but one patriotic band of brothers."

Recently, I traveled to Philadelphia, not for the first time, and entered the room in Independence Hall where the founders met to create our government. All of the original colonies were represented. Their purpose was to consider the case for independence. Together they pledged to each other, "their lives, fortunes and their sacred honor." As I stood in the Assembly Room of the Pennsylvania State House, now known as Independence Hall, and recalled that the Declaration of Independence was drafted here, I was struck by the power and sacredness of the room. The Declaration explains to the world why the Thirteen Colonies regarded themselves as independent, sovereign states no longer subject to British Colonial rule. The 56 delegates ratified the Declaration on July 4, 1776.

It is important to note that the Constitutional Convention, assembled in May of 1787, worked through a long, hot summer with windows shuttered so that those present could speak freely. The Founders bypassed the State Legislatures, reasoning that their members would be reluctant to give up power to a national government. The men present were as diverse in opinion as American citizens are today. They were federalists, liberals and conservatives, those who believed it was their duty to end the abuses of parliament and some who believed that imperial sovereignty should be held by a new government. The diverse concerns have been part of our history and the foundation of our way of government which has endured a lot in almost 250 years. The Constitution was ratified in 1788, and remains the supreme law of the land today.

In two years, our nation will celebrate the 250th Birthday of America called the Semiguincentennial! Our founding Patriots need to be honored for the wonderful government that they gave us and for their many sacrifices. Okaloosa County was honored to receive the first America 250! Patriot Marker in Florida. This marker celebrates the brave Patriots who founded our nation and can be found in Women Veterans Park on Okaloosa Island. These markers are placed across the nation in celebration of our nation's Semiquincentennial.

As we approach Christmas, let us remember a Christmas of long ago, when, in 1776, George Washington and the Continental Army crossed the river during a brutal snow storm. A few hours later Washington attacked Trenton, defeated the Hessians, and turned the tide of war. The misery of these soldiers cannot be understated.

I recently finished reading A Memoir of a Revolutionary Soldier written by Joseph Plumb Martin. This is the only first-person account of what it was like to be a Revolutionary War Soldier. I wish every American citizen, and those on the path to citizenship, had the opportunity to read this book to learn about the misery and hunger experienced by those who fought for the freedoms we enjoy. Did you know we have two Revolutionary War Soldiers buried in Okaloosa County, Privates Snowden and Horne?

Standing in the presence of the Liberty Bell, framed by the Continental Hall in the background, I thought 'let freedom ring' and the words of the song "America" came to me,

"Our fathers' God to Thee, Author of Liberty, to Thee we sing; long may our land be bright with freedom's Holy Light, protect us by Thy might, Great God our King. (Fourth verse by Samuel Francis Smith).

As Ben Franklin, the oldest of the Delegates, left the Constitutional Convention stairs in 1787, he was approached by a well-known socialite, Elizabeth Willing Powel, who asked him what did you give us a Republic or a Monarchy? His famous response, "A Republic if you can keep it." These words haunt us or at least should, because our fight to keep our Republic continues today by American citizens.

It is an honor to serve as your County Commissioner and Vice Chairman for 2025.





Beware of Elder Fraud

According to a 2023 FBI report, Americans aged 60 and older lost an estimated \$3 billion to scammers. The report adds that this figure could be low due to various factors such as only about half of the reports included information about the victim's age, meaning that elder fraud is likely underrepresented. Additionally, there is a level of shame or embarrassment about being the victim of a scam. So,

it's possible that many incidents go unreported. But these crimes have become so sophisticated that even the savviest of consumers can fall victim. Scammers try to take advantage of those most vulnerable in society. That's why it is important to educate all consumers to know what to look for.

Artificial Intelligence scams are highly technical and involve replicating the voice of a loved one. A phone call will sound like

a family member is in trouble and needs money urgently. To avoid falling prey to this scam, establish a code word with your loved ones to verify their identity. Romance scams are most often the result of internet dating; be wary of any romantic interests or new friends asking you to send them money, especially if you've never met in person. Tech support scams can generate from fake pop-up messages on your computer or emails stating that there is something wrong with your device. Once you click into the message, you are asked to give remote access to your computer, at which point the scammer can pilfer your sensitive data.

Bank or company impersonation scams are some of the most successful and sneaky to uncover. Scammers will pretend to be from a reputable, familiar company to warn you about problems with your account or order. They'll try to trick the consumer into sharing personal or financial information. Don't pick up phone calls from numbers you don't recognize or answer unsolicited texts or emails. Law enforcement impersonation scams can be the most unnerving as a scammer will pose as a representative from the IRS, Social Security or law

enforcement, demanding immediate payments or threatening criminal action. Be advised that in most cases, government agencies will contact you by mail and not by phone or email

The prevalence of scams does increase during the holiday season. With so much online shopping, it can be easy to fall for a company impersonation. Fake websites for stores are done so well that it can be difficult to determine what is real and what is a scam. This applies to charity websites, too. Charitable donations increase around the holidays and scammers are ready to take your money.

A lesser-known scam affecting seniors is medical fraud, and it takes shape in many different ways. It can look like a reputable company consistently sending you medical devices or supplies that you did not request and/or do not need. Your insurance is then billed for exorbitant costs. Medical scams can also be the promise of a miracle cure for sale. To protect yourself, be wary of offers that seem too good to be true; don't give out your



Medicare number or other personal information to people you don't know; talk to your doctor before buying medical products; and avoid odd payment types such as gift cards, money orders or wire transfers.

Stay safe online, remain vigilant, and don't let scammers be a grinch in your holiday season! If you believe you may have been the victim of a scam, report it to the FTC online or call 1-877-FTC-HELP (1-877-382-4357).

Shattered by Suicide: A Mother's Mission to Save Lives

In the early hours of December 23, 2018, Diane Cooke's life was forever changed by a heartbreaking phone call. Her 20-year-old son, Drew, had taken his own life. As a mother, Diane was devastated and confused. She had known that Drew was struggling emotionally in the months leading up to his death, but she had believed that this difficult period was just a passing chapter in his life. Drew was under the care of a counselor and a psychiatrist, and Diane felt confident that, with the support of professionals, medication and the love of their family, he would be able to navigate through the storm. Tragically, this was not the case. Now, Diane is sharing her story in the hope of saving others.

According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (afsp.org), 49,476 Americans died by suicide in 2022, making it the 11th leading cause of death in the U.S. An estimat-



ed 1.6 million people attempted suicide that year. Reflecting on Drew's experiences, Diane suspects that the actual number might be even higher. During the last five years of his life, Drew had several incidents that, in hindsight, appear to have been suicide attempts, although they were not recognized as such at the time.

What Diane Has Learned About Suicide:

Not Everyone Talks About Their Struggles: In the days before his death, Drew did not speak about ending his life. On the contrary, he spent time with his mother, helping



her bake cookies just the day before. While Diane was aware that Drew was dealing with the challenges many young adults face-such as the end of a serious relationship and hurtful rumors-she did not realize these issues felt life and death for him. She wishes she had asked him directly about his feelings. Though she can't be certain he would have opened up, the conversation might have provided an opportunity to offer him life saving support. It's a common fear that asking someone if they are having suicidal thoughts might introduce the idea, but this fear is unfounded. If a loved one seems to be struggling, asking if they feel safe can be crucial, especially if they have had past incidents like single-car accidents, overdoses or risky behavior.

Take Every Statement Seriously: When someone expresses thoughts of suicide, it's vital to take them seriously. Sometimes, these expressions are mistaken for attention-seeking behavior, but suicidal thoughts often manifest as casual comments like, "It would be easier for everyone if I were gone," "I don't know if I can do this anymore," or "If I died tomorrow, life would go on." Drew was a vibrant and joyful young man who loved to make others laugh. He had many friends and was known for his kindness and sense of humor. However, he also struggled with significant mental health issues that affected his mood, perceptions, impulsivity and judgment. If a loved one makes comments that hint at giving up or dying, it's important to ask questions, listen carefully and help them access resources that can keep them safe.

Explore All Treatment Options: Diane believed that the love and support Drew received would be enough to carry him through his difficult time. Since his passing, she has learned much more about mental health and the various ways it can be treated. There are now many innovative treatments available that are highly effective for those struggling with mood disorders that don't respond well to traditional therapies. To help others, Diane partnered with her childhood friend, Melanie Yost, to open Be Well Solutions and Complete Ketamine Solutions in Destin. Their mission is to provide affordable and effective brain health therapies, such as Ketamine Infusion Therapy and Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy, to help people heal and reclaim their lives. Diane hopes that by offering these treatments, others won't have to suffer as Drew did.

"You wouldn't know it's the holiday season around here," says Doug Kuba, owner of the Gulf Breeze-based Everlights by Design as well as Everlights Orlando. "Things don't die down in January."

Today, Kuba is in Fairhope, Ala., installing 551 feet of Everlights and over 700 feet of gutters (his other business, Gutters by Design, has been going strong for years). The site is a new neighborhood of upscale homes, and it's Kuba's second biggest project of 2024.

Kuba's work entails a lot of travel. Everlights by Design's service area covers Biloxi, Mississippi through Panama City and everything in between. Plus, Orlando, where he employs a full-time sales manager and visits at least once a month.

A typical day runs about 12 hours, and Kuba's companies install six days a week. Come mid-November, Sundays are added to meet customer demand. "A lot of people didn't want to buy it because it was such a big area, and expensive."

Along with residential lighting, Everlights by Design has taken on commercial projects, including the Chick-Fil-A restaurant in DeFuniak Springs. "Customers are making the investment and earning it back," says Kuba. "They thank us for setting them apart from other businesses.

"We can custom install Everlights anywhere. You tell us where you want them, and we can do it."

Everlights by Design is one of the fastest growing businesses on the coast and is celebrating its one-year anniversary this month. "This is the only company in the world that does fourth-generation red-greenblue LED lighting," says Kuba. "If you mix the colors, you



can get every color on the spectrum, over 20,000. The lights have multiple effects for every occasion, every holiday – everything you can think of. Some of our customers use the lights for security."

Before Everlights was added to Kuba's gutter business, his customers often called on him and his team to put up and remove their Christmas lights. "So, I toured the Everlights factory in Utah, and my wife and I decided to make another company."

Actually, two other companies if you include Orlando. "It's one of the hottest markets in the country," Out of 271 Everlights dealers, Everlights of the Gulf Coast is currently the second largest in the country after Sacramento, Calif. "We may overtake them by January," he says.

"One day, we're a gutter company in Gulf Breeze, and the next we're a multi-million-dollar business. Our product is for everyone. You don't have to be a millionaire."

One benefit of Everlights is the ability to mix and choose for any occasion. "With the touch of a button, you can go from Fourth of July to Saint Patrick's Day," says Kuba. "Every holiday on the calendar is pre-programmed, and you can do it from your smartphone."

Everlights employs AI technology to identify and diagnose potential power and data issues. "We call and then we go out there and take care of it."

The company is growing as fast as Kuba can enlist more installers and gutter people. "Gutter installation is a skill," he says. "You need about 17 years of experience, and usually you apprentice for five to seven years to get onto a crew."

Customer feedback has been consistently positive. "We refuse to take your final payment if we don't earn a five-star review." Kuba also offers a referral program where clients can earn a \$200 VISA gift card. "Our customers get to share in the profits."

A Pastor's Ponderings: The Wise Men Never Met Jesus as a Baby in a Manger

It's a familiar scene often portrayed in nativity displays: the wise men gather around a baby in a manger. However, a closer look at the Bible reveals a different picture. According to Scripture, by the time the wise men arrived in Bethlehem, Jesus was not an infant in a stable but a "young child" living in a house. This insight corrects our understanding of the Christmas story



and underscores the importance of studying Scripture carefully.

Jesus Was a "Young Child" - Not a Baby

Matthew gives us a clear sense of Jesus' age when the wise men arrived. Matthew 2:11 reads, "And when they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary his mother." Jesus is consistently referred to as a "young child" in Matthew's account (e.g., Matthew 2:8), not as a baby, and the wise men find Him in a "house," not a stable, indicating time had passed since His birth.

Herod's Decree: The **Killing of Children Under Two Years Old**

Another critical detail is Herod's decree to kill all male children "from two years old and un*der.*" After the wise men did not return, Herod, fearing this "King of the Jews," ordered the massacre. Matthew 2:16 explains Herod's order was based on the timing he had *"diligently enquired* of the wise men." This reveals that Jesus could have been as old as two years, further confirming He was no longer an infant at the time of the wise men's visit.

The Star: A Sign After Jesus' Birth

The timing of the star also matters. In Matthew 2:2, the wise men say, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him." The star appeared after Jesus' birth, leading

the wise men on a long journey, likely from Persia or Babylon, taking several months or more. By the time they arrived, Jesus was a young child in a house.

Why This Matters: The Importance of Correcting **Misconceptions**

Some may ask if it's harmless to believe that the wise men visited Jesus as a baby in the manger. However, the Bible calls us to seek truth diligently (Acts 17:11). Holding to tradition over Scripture can obscure the depth and historical context of God's word. Every detail in Jesus' life, even His age when visited by the wise men, emphasizes His identity as Messiah.

A Call to Seek the Truth in **Scripture**

As Christians, we are called to be "children of light" (Ephesians 5:8), letting God's word

guide us. Jesus warned against "the tradition of men" that can obscure truth (Mark 7:13). In understanding the wise men's visit accurately, we honor Scripture's integrity and deepen our faith in the God who came to save us. Including the wise men in a manger scene isn't the end of the world, and it's a cherished part of many holiday traditions. However, in our family, we set the wise men further away to reflect on their journey and later arrival, reminding us of the story's true timeline and the importance of grounding our faith in Scripture.

"That smell," the child said, as we walked into the door.

She used her white cane to trace the perimeter of the aisle,

navigating between booth and bar and jukebox. "What is that smell?" she said. Nose to the ceiling.

"It's bacon," said my wife.

"Are you having a good day" says our waitress.

"Yes, we are!!" says the kid, using not one but two exclamation points.

She ordered eggs, scrambled. Bacon, crispy. White toast, buttered within an inch of its grain. Strawberry jam. An Irish pint of chocolate milk. A giant waffle blueberry.

The waitress drew a whipped-cream smiley face on the waffle. Nobody asked her to do that.

When the meal was finished, the waitresses asked, "Has it been a good first visit to Waffle House?"

But the kid can't answer. Her mouth is still full.

So the waitresses offered to pose for a picture with us, to commemorate the monumental occasion. One that will not soon be forgotten.

We all pose. The photographer holds the camera and tells us all to smile. "Say cheese," says the photographer.



"No," says one waitress, kissing the blind girl's head. "Don't say cheese. On the count of three, let's everyone say, 'Love!"

Whereupon every customer joined in unison, counting down with the photographer. We all counted.

"ONE...! TWO...!" Love.



Representative Patt Maney Receives Boy Scouts' Highest Award

On October 24, surrounded by family, friends, colleagues and community leaders, State Representative Patt Maney received the prestigious Distinguished Eagle Scout Award (DESA), joining an elite group of fewer than 2,500 recipients, including Neil Armstrong and Gerald Ford. The ceremony, held at the Hilton Garden Inn and emceed by Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber President Ted Corcoran, celebrated a lifetime of service and commitment. Every tribute spoke to the extraordinary achievements and unwavering dedication that have marked Maney's career, reaching far beyond Okaloosa County to make a global impact. Even Maney's home state of Kentucky recognized his achievements when the University of Kentucky bestowed upon him an Honorary Doctor of Laws.

He is only the second Eagle Scout recipient from the Gulf Coast Council, encompassing Northwest Florida and South Alabama. William James, a local Eagle Scout from Holt who worked alongside Maney, spearheaded the nomination. James, a retired Sergeant First Class with the National Guard, took the initiative to acknowledge Maney's outstanding career and service.

"Patt became a Scout in February of 1964," remarked Vince Mayfield, CEO of Bit-Wizards and an Eagle Scout himself. "Since then, he's made an impact not only on our county, not only on our state, not only on the United States of America, but he's made an impact in the entire world." These words resonated deeply in a room filled with individuals whose lives have been touched by Maney's service and mentorship. His wife, Caroline, stood proudly by his side, representing the personal support central to his journey.

Maney's history of service is a narrative of resilience, courage, and a commitment to bettering the lives of others. After earning the rank of Eagle Scout in 1965, he dedicated himself to a

His career as a Brigadier General in the U.S. Army led him to Afghanistan, where he served as a senior political sector advisor, helping coordinate the country's first free presidential election. Tragically, he was severely wounded by an IED in 2005, and his 20-month recovery at Walter Reed Army Medical Center became a testament to his tenacity.

The night's tributes highlighted Maney's influence in military and public service and his role as a Florida State Representative, County Judge, and advocate for veterans. Maney's contributions have paved the way for veterans' treatment programs, mental health initiatives, and judiciary reform. The "T. Patt Maney Veterans' Treatment Intervention Act" is a legacy of his dedication to helping veterans reintegrate into civilian life, a cause deeply meaningful to him as a Purple Heart recipient. "My parents had seven children," Maney said, turning emotional as he acknowledged his older brother,



Edward, a Vietnam veteran he described as his hero.

The Distinguished Eagle Scout Award, presented by the National Eagle Scout Association and the Gulf Coast Council, honored Maney's lifetime achievements, drawing community leaders from across the state. District Attorney Ginger Madden's words echoed the sentiment of the evening, describing him as a man of wisdom, integrity, and unwavering moral strength.

Maney's career is marked by a collection of honors and

recognitions that underscore his profound influence, including the Secretary of Defense Outstanding Public Service Award, the Purple Heart, and the Afghan Ghazi Mir Batcha Kahn Superior Medal. In addition, he was recognized by former Afghanistan Presi-

dent Ashraf Ghani, who praised his contributions to rebuilding Afghanistan and championing justice.

In his acceptance speech, Maney emphasized the role of family, mentors, and community in shaping his life. His deep gratitude was evident as he reflected on the importance of Scouting and its lasting impact on his character and values. "Boys need activity, and boys need male leaders," he said, adding that Scouting is possible only through the dedication of volunteers and generous supporters.
