Festival of the Arts Marks 30 Years of Color, Creativity and Community

The first time I walked into the Mattie Kelly Arts Foundation office, it felt like coming home. It reminded me of my mom—a talented artist with a gift for detail who loved bringing barns, old buildings, people, trees and landscapes to life in watercolor and pen & ink. Growing up, weekends often meant traveling to art shows, helping her set up and soaking in the creative buzz of those events. I even sold my own pet rocks (don't judgesome of you remember!) and tried my hand at leatherwork

and paint. Those early shows were my first classrooms in community—how art unites strangers in one place and somehow sends them home as friends.

Media Group was the extraordinary, worldwide impact of his ministry. The following excerpt is drawn from an editorial written by Metropolitan Tikhon Shevkuno, Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church, in an article from Orthodox Christianity—offering a perspective from the other side of the Christian faith tradition.

Excerpt from Metropolitan Tikhon Shevkuno, Patriarch of the **Russian Orthodox Church:**

Just a week ago, the name Charlie Kirk was virtually unknown in Russia. Then, like a supernova explosion, he burst into our information space, unleashing a wave of both indignation and admiration. Some saw in him the embodiment of values they found unacceptable and reacted with open hatred and outrage toward Kirk: "How can an American (an American!) be like that?

Others—astonished grieved that he is no longer among the living-discovered in him an unexpected kindred spirit. Death, without a doubt, became both the chief sermon and the pinnacle of Charles Kirk's ministry. It also illuminated his complete image—one

filled with faith, resolve and Christian love—refuting the slanders of those who read the Gospel with their soul's eyes shut, failing to understand that the bold defense of Gospel truth is love in action.

The murderer—and all those who stood behind himare powerless to place a final period on the existence of a man who believes in Christ. And in the hearts of millions of his like-minded followers and friends, Charlie's martyred death breathed new, greatly multiplied life in service of their goals, thoughts, and convictions.

In an age of post-truth, relativism, and libertarianismwhen reality is constructed by the media and social networks, and conformity has become the norm—truth is drowning in a sea of political correctness. Charlie Kirk dared to go against the current. He acknowledged no shades of gray, no compromises, no deals with the conscience. He couldn't have cared less about what was fashionable, accepted, or dictated by the crowd. He allowed himself a luxury almost unheard of in our time—to call things by their proper names, even if that meant that such a royal choice would, inevitably and without a doubt, bring a series of con-

Tm nothing without Jesus. I'm a sinner. I fall incredibly short of the glory of God. We all do. I gave my life to the Lord in fifth grade, and it's the most important decision I've ever made, and everything I do incorporates Jesus Christ."

What is especially admirable about Charlie Kirk is his willingness to go and speak about the Kingdom of Heaven, about traditional values, about conservative principles in the very places that seemed most unsuitable—places whose inhabitants, for the most part, do not want to hear anything of the kind. Shane Weddle, Owner of FastSigns:

"Leaning Into" His Community

Though Shane has only been in Okaloosa County for four years, the magnitude of his involvement in the community makes it seem as if he has lived here much longer.

Shane came to us from just outside Jacksonville, Fla. He was looking to buy a business. Having been in corporate manufacturing for 20 years, Shane had decided he didn't want to work for people anymore. He had worked his way up the ladder, but after so many years, he wasn't happy.

At first, he thought he would do something he knew well. Shane had experience in making lithium batteries, satellite antennas, and firearm accessories and armor. However, those products were highly capital intensive. For a short time, he thought maybe he would go into firearms holster manufacturing but that market was saturated.

A franchise coach found Shane on LinkedIn. She presented Shane with a dozen franchise opportunities. He looked online and found a sign company for sale in Fort Walton Beach. He had visited in 2015 while attending a wedding and loved the area. So, he came and visited the sign shop. And saw a lot of military products.

From Indiana originally, Shane enlisted in the Navy and served three years. He served on a guided missile destroyer participating in Caribbean drug operations, in Bosnia and Kosovo in 1993, and served in the National Guard for three years. When he inspected the sign shop and saw the military connection, he knew he was where he was supposed to be.

As the new owner of Fast-Signs, Shane joined the Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce immediately. He currently serves on the board and is chairman of the Military Affairs Committee. Shane is also an Honorary Commander for the 58th Fighter Wing at Eglin and the 3rd Battalion at 7th Group Special Forces.

At first, community involvement and "giving back" weren't a line item for Shane's company. Then he started to, as he says, "lean into" giving back to his



new community. He says it may be what makes his sign company different – how much they engage and how many people they have the opportunity to help. Supporting various causes is now a big part of what he does.

He has given his employees the authority to give away what they deem appropriate. Shane says it is fruitful personally. It "does something for you" when you engage. He defines engagement as writing a check but also showing up. Some of the community projects he supports include One Hopeful Place, Motorcycle Riding Events of America, and the Savage Loop run. He is also a member of One Okaloosa Economic Development Council's Tri-County Partnership Initiative (TCPI) and Defense Support Initiative (DSI) committees.

A board member of Motorcycle Riding Events of America, Shane has worked to raise money to provide LifeVac devices for schools, daycare centers, nursing homes and law enforcement. So far, they have provided over 700 devices from Pensacola to Tallahassee in a year-and-ahalf. The first recipient was the Fort Walton Beach Police Department. There is a device in every patrol vehicle. There are





two confirmed reports so far of lives saved.

Recently Shane has become a community representative advocating for the preservation of the Eglin Gulf Test Range. He and others are asking for a bill to be passed that would lock in this protection for a lifetime. Shane recently returned from Washington D.C. where he participated in talks with the Department of the Interior, Oceana and Representative Patronis.

Shane simply states we have

two industries in Okaloosa County that make up the bulk of our economy: the military and tourism. Drilling would negatively impact both. Drilling prevents testing, which would result in a loss of ability to bring war to our country's enemies and to defend our nation. We have all seen what an oil spill does to the environment and to tourism.

As you can see Shane has done a lot of "leaning into" community involvement in just four short years. We have no doubt he will continue to be an energetic asset to our area.





FWB High School Inducts Three Longtime Educators into Viking Hall Of Fame

Fort Walton Beach High School honored three longtime educators who shaped generations of students when it inducted them into the Viking Hall of Fame on Friday, October 3, during halftime of the football game.

The 2025 inductees — Kevin Craig, Barbara Britt and Randy Folsom — make up a combined 93 years of service to the school and left lasting impacts across athletics, academics and the arts.

Kevin Craig: Coach Craig built the Lady Vikings basketball program into a powerhouse during his 22-season tenure as head coach from 1982 to 2003. His teams earned 509 wins, 10 district championships, seven regional titles, six Final Four ap-

pearances and two state championships. Craig, who served 25 years total at Fort Walton Beach High School beginning in 1979, coined the team's enduring motto "Whatever It Takes."

Beyond basketball, Craig taught physical education and coached multiple sports including JV football, softball, track, cross country and tennis. He and his wife Lisa have six children and seven grandchildren.

Barbara Britt: Barbara Britt transformed student leadership during her 36-year career at the school from 1977 to 2013. As a leadership teacher, she expanded the program from 30 to more than 300 students, creating a curriculum that prepared students for college and careers through personal portfolios and community projects.

Her leadership launched ini-







tiatives supporting military families, local schools and homeless feeding programs, including the Silver Sands Prom.

As Physical Education Department Head and head cheer-leading coach, Britt ensured Title IX compliance and expanded athletic opportunities for female students by introducing competitive cheerleading, dance and weightlifting programs. She helped build the women's field house and holds

certifications in John Maxwell Leadership Training, DISC Personality Insights, and Diversity and Inclusion.

Randy Folsom: Randy Folsom helped lead the Viking band program to national recognition during his

tenure from 1988 to 2020. Starting as assistant band director in 1988, he became Director of Bands in 1999 and guided the marching, jazz and symphonic bands to consistently earn the highest ratings at district, state and national events.

Under Folsom's direction, the bands performed at prestigious venues including the Pearl Harbor 75th Anniversary Celebration and the National Band Festival at Carnegie Hall. His honors include serving as president of the Florida Bandmasters Association, receiving the FBA Oliver Hobbs Award in 2006, the Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Bandmaster in 2015, and induction into the FBA Hall of Fame in 2011. He was also named Fort Walton Beach High School Teacher of the Year in 2011.

Many of Folsom's former students have become music educators themselves, with several serving as band directors in Okaloosa County. The band program was a family affair — his sons Wade and Grant graduated from Fort Walton Beach High School, while his wife Gail served in various positions including teacher, staffing specialist, testing coordinator and dean of students before they both retired in 2020.

Brothers in Service: Buckthal Eagles Make Their Mark

The Town of Shalimar is beaming with pride over the accomplishments of brothers Bradley and Chandler Buckthal, both members of Scouts BSA Troop 529, who have recently achieved milestones that showcase leadership, service and dedication.

On Sept. 17, 2025, Bradley Buckthal, 17, was honored by the Town of Shalimar with a Certificate of Recognition for being named an alternate delegate to the American Legion Boys Nation program. Considered the pinnacle of the Legion's youth leadership initiatives, Boys Nation brings a



select group of high school students to Washington, D.C., each summer for a weeklong mock Senate. Delegates debate bills, elect leaders, meet with top officials and gain firsthand insight into civic life. Selection requires

excellence in academics, leadership and service—qualities
Bradley has consistently displayed as an Eagle Scout and community leader.

Meanwhile, his younger brother, Chandler Buckthal, a



freshman at Fort Walton Beach High School, cleared a major hurdle toward earning Scouting's highest honor—Eagle Scout—by leading the construction of a fully equipped archery range that will benefit thousands of students for years to come. A member of Scouts BSA Troop 529, Buckthal selected the project after recognizing a need for upgrading his school's archery range.

With help from a volunteer crew, Buckthal designed and built a 50-by-60-foot range that met official National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) standards. They first leveled the field, framed it and filled it with gravel. To finish it off, they installed target, 10-meter and 15-meter shooting lines, built sturdy benches for archers and mounted a cable-and-pole system to safely hang the arrow-catching curtain.

What's Happening in Okaloosa County?

I thought it might be of interest to have a few highlights of community projects from your Board of County Commissioners.

Lazarus Memorial Service

On Monday, November 3, 2025, at 10 a.m. at the Beal Memorial Cemetery, more than 35 clergy and members from various faith communities will gather to remember and say goodbye to the invisible members of our local community. The Lazarus Memorial Service is an ecumenical ceremony to bury individuals in our community who have died without means to provide for their own burial. The ceremony provides a dignified manner to memorialize the cremains of those who otherwise would not have funeral services. It is our community's outpouring of respect and community spirit to provide the unclaimed deceased a dignified resting place.

The ceremony has become a much-celebrated event within the faith community, and in the life of our county, as a dignified



way to memorialize those we have lost. Some of the deceased are senior citizens who have outlived their relatives, some are infants and children whose parents and families are without financial means, but many individuals are those members of our community who have become estranged from their families. This year we have 30 individuals.

Fairground Renovation

The renovation of the fairground facility, now known as The Rigdon Center, is in full swing. The county has almost completely renovated much of the inside of the buildings, ceilings, walls, lighting, electric, HVAC and roofing, and demolished several of the older, obsolete buildings. We are now



working on flooring, technology, bath rooms and storm water. We are now bidding out a project addition for two new catering kitchens, bathrooms and a concession area. Behind this project will be a project to redo the entrances and façades.

Bridge to Bridge Bike Path Ribbon Cutting

The much-anticipated opening of the 12-foot-wide Bike Path from Brooks Bridge to Destin (Marler Bridge) will be on October 23rd, 2025 at 10 a.m. This project has been a partnership of the county and Eglin AFB using public funding as well as private. The roadway is open to walkers and bikes, not golf carts. We continue to work with Eglin to prevent cars from using it. A rope fence is being



considered along the roadway to prevent any vehicles from accessing it.

The path will sparkle blue at night as the photo luminescent rocks added to the asphalt glow from the absorption of sunlight during the day. The pathway will be a community asset that is fun for recreation while protecting individuals from injury as it provides a safe pathway.

Extension Services Building


The new south end Extension Services Building will soon

Post-Acute Care for Seniors:

The Critical Bridge After a Hospital Stay

The autumn season, with its rich colors and comforting traditions, offers a wonderful opportunity to enhance the postacute care and rehabilitation experience. The landscape of post-acute senior care is rapidly evolving, moving away from a one-size-fits-all approach toward personalized, technology-driven, and holistic models. As the senior population grows in our area, innovative ideas are being implemented to improve outcomes, enhance quality of life and address the complex needs of patients transitioning from acute care settings like hospitals.

Post-acute care (PAC) refers to a range of medical and supportive services provided to patients, particularly seniors, who are discharged from an acute care hospital, but aren't yet



ready to return home and live independently. Following an illness, surgery or injury, a hospital stay can often be destabilizing for older adults, leading to a decline in their physical and mental functioning. PAC serves as a critical transition to promote functional recovery, maximize independence and prevent unnecessary hospital readmissions. For seniors transitioning out of the hospital, whether to a PAC (Post Acute Care) facility or directly home, preparation and proactive management are vital for a successful recovery.

Benefits and Challenges for Older Adults: Benefits of Post-Acute Care in a Skilled Nursing and Rehab Facility:

Increased Independence: The primary goal is to help seniors regain strength and functional abilities (like walking, dressing, and eating) to become more self-sufficient.

Reduced Readmissions: Close monitoring and ongoing medical support help to identify and address potential complications early, which significantly lowers the risk of the patient returning to the hospital within 30 days.

Access to Specialized Care: Patients receive care from a multidisciplinary team, including specialized 24/7 nursing care (i.e. wound care, IV therapy, medication management), physical therapists, speech therapists, occupational therapists, and physicians who focus specifically on recovery. The goal is for the

patient to regain strength and function and safely return home.

Understand the Discharge Plan: Meet with the hospital's discharge planner or case manager as early as possible. Get written clear instructions on all new or changed medications, wound care, activity restrictions, and signs of complications to watch for.

Complexity of Discharge Planning: The process of choosing the right setting, understanding insurance coverage, and coordinating care can be confusing and stressful. Carefully review what all post-acute hospital providers offer. It is your right to choose where you would like to go for post-hospital care. Make an informed choice.

Insurance for Post-Acute Care: Insurance coverage for this type of care is particularly through regular Medicare.

General overview of Medicare coverage for key post-acute care settings:

Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) Care Insurance Coverage

Coverage: Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) covers skilled nursing care on a short-term basis for rehabilitation or skilled medical care.

Conditions for Coverage:

- You must have a qualifying inpatient hospital stay of at least three consecutive days (not counting the day of discharge).
- You must enter the SNF generally within 30 days of leaving the hospital.
- A doctor must certify that you need daily skilled nursing or rehabilitation services.
- The facility must be Medicare-certified.

Costs (in one benefit period):

Days 1–20: You pay \$0 for covered services (after meeting the Part A deductible for the hospital stay).

Days 21–100: You pay a daily coinsurance amount (which changes annually).

Days 101 and beyond: You pay all costs.

Limitation: Coverage is limited to 100 days per benefit period and ends sooner if you no longer require skilled care. Medicare generally does not cover long-term or custodial care in a nursing home.

Medicare Advantage (Part C) Plans: These private plans must cover at least the same post-acute care benefits as original Medicare, but they may have different cost-sharing (copayments/deductibles) and may require you to use specific in-network providers. We often see a patient who has a MA (Part C) plan and still think they have regular Medicare. Be sure to check your plan as not all postacute providers are in network or accept Part C plans. Part C Plans (MA) require an authorization by your insurance company and your care is monitored by a caseworker at the insurance agency.

Medicare Supplement (Medigap) Plans: These plans work with Original Medicare and can help pay for out-of-pocket costs like the SNF daily

As cooler weather arrives, families start running dryers more often, plugging in space heaters and lighting fireplaces. These seasonal changes make October the best month to catch risks before they become emergencies.

Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Many home-

owners only think about them when they hear the dreaded low-battery chirp at 2 a.m. The problem? By then, the detector may have been silent for months. We once met a family who assumed their detectors were working — until a kitchen mishap filled the house with smoke, and not a single alarm went off. Testing takes just seconds and can be life-saving.

Don't overlook the dryer vent. Lint is highly flammable and builds up quickly, even if you clean the lint trap. Pulling the dryer away from the wall once a year and cleaning the vent hose dramatically reduces risk. One homeowner told us they noticed clothes taking longer to dry; the cause wasn't the dryer at all but a vent so clogged it was a fire waiting to happen. After cleaning, not only was it safer, but laundry dried faster.

Inspect fireplaces and chimneys. Creosote, the byproduct of burning wood, builds up in chimneys and can ignite. A local

family shared that they hadn't cleaned their chimney in over a decade. When they finally had it swept, the chimney sweep removed buckets of debris. Waiting any longer could have meant a dangerous fire. If you haven't scheduled a chimney inspection in years, October is the time.

Space heaters deserve extra care. They're convenient for chilly nights but account for nearly half of all heating-related fires in the U.S. Place them at least three feet from curtains, bedding, or furniture, and never plug them into extension cords. We've seen homeowners melt outlets because the wiring wasn't built to handle the load.

Fire extinguishers and escape plans matter, too. Every home should have an extinguisher in the kitchen and garage, and family members should know where they are. Practice a quick escape plan, especially if you have children. In the stress of an actual fire, muscle memory helps.



Most of these are simple tasks — checking alarms, cleaning vents, reviewing safety plans. They're about prevention, not repair.

FWB and Destin Rotary Clubs **Team Up for Rescue Tubes**

The Rotary Club of Destin has expanded its Public Rescue Tube (PRT) Project which began with installations in the City of Destin earlier this year, to now include additional locations throughout Okaloosa County beaches.

Phase 1 of this countywide expansion, which is being done in partnership with the Rotary Club of Fort Walton Beach, will place 26 new rescue tubes at public beach access points. Already, 16 tubes are fully sponsored by local businesses and individuals, leaving only 10 sponsorship opportunities available at the time of this printing. Each \$500 sponsorship covers the cost of the rescue tube, installation and five years of maintenance, with the sponsor's name/logo featured on the tube's signage for that period.

"These tubes are already making a difference at Destin beach accesses," said Rotary project co-chairs Dion Moniz and Wayne Bernheisel. "Now,

we are excited to expand this lifeguard protection. proven program across more parts of Okaloosa County, making our beaches even safer for residents and visitors."

The Facts Behind Rescue Tubes

- 600+ stations are already in place across the U.S. and Can-
- 200+ successful rescues have been made using these tubes.
- Every known rescue with a tube has been successful.
- No rescuer has ever been injured while using a Rescue

Why Rescue Tubes Work

According to the World Health Organization, drowning is the third leading cause of unintentional death worldwide, claiming approximately 236,000 lives each year. It is also the #1 cause of death for children ages 1-4. Florida recorded 465 accidental drowning deaths in 2023, many in areas without

Rescue tubes provide flotation for both the victim and the bystander attempting a rescue, dramatically reducing the risk of a double tragedy. A 25-year study by the Hawaii Department of Health found that rescuer deaths fell from 60% to 13% after PRTs were installed: in areas without tubes, there was no reduction in rescuer deaths, while in areas with tubes there was a 100% reduction in rescuer deaths.

District-Wide Safety Effort

The Destin initiative is part of a larger regional effort led by Rotary Clubs and partners to protect swimmers across Northwest Florida. Rescue tubes have already been installed or approved in the following areas: Navarre (16), Perdido Key (4), Pensacola Beach (5), Panama City Beach (10), Bay County (10), Destin (9), Freeport (2), Eglin AFB (2) and Walton County (58). With Okaloosa County's planned 26 new installations,



the Emerald Coast is quickly becoming one of the most rescue-ready beach regions in the country.

Affordable & Sustainable

While each PRT station costs roughly \$245 to install (tube, signage, post, hardware), the \$500 sponsorship fee ensures long-term sustainability. Rotary members and volunteers inspect the stations every 4-6 weeks, before peak tourist seasons and after major storms. Annual community "work parties" handle larger repairs, and signage includes a public phone number for reporting damage or missing equipment.

"This is a hands-on way to save lives in our community." Moniz said. "We encourage local businesses and individuals to join us in this important effort."

With a few ceremonial swings from Mayor Nic Allegretto, the Fort Walton Beach Golf Club officially opened its new Trackman Driving Range on Friday, Sept. 26.

Each of the range's 25 bays is now outfitted with Trackman, a Doppler radar system that tracks every aspect of a shot—carry distance, ball speed, launch angle, peak height, and more. Results are displayed on a 32-inch touchscreen, along with a shot tracer to show ball flight.

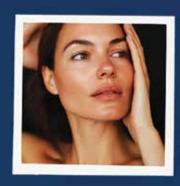

Pain in the Foot

Over the last couple months, I have talked to friends and acquaintances that have shared their struggle with Planter Fasciitis. Maybe you or someone you know is dealing with this 'pain in the foot.'

The plantar fascia (noted as pf) if a fibrous tissue that connects the toes to the heel along the bottom of the foot. This

thick band can become overstretched or have excess strain due to repetitive stress, which can lead to chronic degeneration or small tears in the fascia fibers where it connects to the heel bone. In addition, ultrasounds often show calcifications and a thickening of the pf.

The cause is not fully understood, but has been connected to activities such as running, ballet and other types of dance, age, weight or occupation.

The pain experienced most often shows up first thing in the morning when the foot first touches the floor and is localized in the heel. This is due to overnight inactivity and the pf stiffening (like a sore muscle). Choosing to avoid walking on the foot can eventually lead to problems in the foot, knee, hip

There are several therapies that can aid in the healing process:

- Stretching: Take time before letting your feet hit the floor to slowly stretch. Place your ankle over your knee, pull the toes up until you feel the stretch. Holding that position gently massage the pf for a few minutes. This will help the pf to relax relieving some of the sharp pain one experiences after a period of inactivity.
- Calf Stretch: Standing in front of a wall bend the knee on the good foot a step back on the affected foot. Slowly move the injured foot from the balls of the foot to placing the heel on the ground. This stretches both the calf and the pf. If you can't place your heel on the ground due to the pain, bring the leg in a bit to lessen the 'stretch.'
- Ice the foot after stretching or if your pf begins to act up due to over-activity.
- Athletic Tape: Learn how to properly apply from a professional such as a physical therapist to support your pf during your active times.
- Night Splints: This over the counter product keeps the pf in a stretched position while you sleep which can lessen the pain experienced upon rising.

• Orthotics: These can sup-

biote



port your pf during the day.

- Boot, Cane, Crutches: These can be helpful with severe cases or to allow the inflammation to decrease before adding other treatments.
- Steroids: The use of steroid injections can offer temporary relief. However, multiple shots are not recommended as they can weaken the pf and possibly cause it to rupture.
- Plasma Injections: Platelet rich plasma from your own blood can be injected to promote healing. An ultrasound is used to aid in precise needle placement.
- Extracorporeal Shock Wave Therapy: This is for chronic plantar fasciitis when other therapies have failed. Sound waves are directed at the

area of the heal pain to stimulate healing. This therapy hasn't been shown to be consistently effective even though some studies have shown promising results.

• Ultrasonic Tissue Repair: A minimally invasive technology where ultrasound imaging is used to guide a needlelike probe into the damaged pf tissue. The probe tip vibrates

rapidly to break up the damaged tissue which is then suctioned out.

• Surgery: When all else fails. The surgery entails detaching the pf from the heel bone.

There are so many fall festivals coming our way. If you don't want to miss your favorite ones, be sure to include breaks throughout your day to stretch and massage your pf and don't forget your orthotics. Taking care of our feet allows us to have a more active and fun life. Even if you have healthy feet, a good foot massage from time to time couldn't hurt.

Making Waves with Veterans and Service Dogs

"When I started this company, my goal was to do more than fix plumbing and go home. I wanted to make an impact on the community," says Tru Plumbing and Gas founder, owner, and CEO Cody Kearns.

"Thanks to the help of our customers, we've already supported A Bed 4 Me Foundation and Healing Paws for Warriors with over \$3,000 in donations. Our goal with this charity initiative is to start a movement that ripples throughout the community." September's charity partner is Niceville-based CALM, with the E.O. Wilson Biophilia Center scheduled for October.

The Niceville business' campaign is called Making Waves, and Kearns believes "we can make waves, one drop at a time. And we're just getting started."

In August, as a lead-in to National Service Dog Month in September, Tru Plumbing and Gas donated \$1,690 to Healing Paws for Warriors to aid in their mission. The Fort Walton Beach 501(c)(3) nonprofit pairs trained rescue dogs with veterans who are living with PTSD, traumatic brain injury, and/or military sexual trauma.

Tru Plumbing and Gas contributed \$10 per completed service call to it's the nonprofit to defray the cost of rescuing dogs, training, veterinary care, and dog food. "Our veterans sacrifice so much. Healing Paws for Warriors gives back to the brave ones who put their lives on the line," says Kearns.



A Beacon of Hope: Crossroads Center Expands with Spiritual Health and Wellness Building

On Tuesday, August 26th, 2025, Crossroads Center celebrated breaking ground for its new Spiritual Health and Wellness building. Cindy Bray summarizes what defines their growth.

"I may be the Executive Director, but really, Crossroads directs me."

Since 2007, Crossroads Center has served our community faithfully, not only through the mission to provide spiritual, medical, and dental care through God's love, but in the unwavering dedication of its Board of Directors, administration, medical providers, counselors and volunteers. Cindy recalls how Crossroads got started.

"In 2005, a mobile dental ministry visited the area, organized by Dr. Herschel Adams, a pastor who has since passed. At that time, he knew he had availability for approximately 70 appointments. On the day he arrived, however, close to 200 people were there, hoping for help. Knowing he didn't have enough appointments, he had to tell over a hundred people that they would not receive care that day, and it broke his heart."

Dr. Adams, acknowledging

the need and determined not to ignore the call, spent the next two years partnering with medical and law professionals, business entities, churches and individuals who wanted to serve their communities.

Since Crossroads opened in 2007, they have served Okaloosa and Walton counties in a way that acknowledges all the different aspects of what it takes to truly feel well – having your medical, emotional, and spiritual needs met with compassionate care.

Three branches make up Crossroads' primary services, free of charge to qualifying patients: medical, dental, and counseling. First, the medical team addresses primary and preventative care with a focus on the management of chronic disease and medication assistance. Select specialists are also available onsite and through referrals. Next, area dentists donate their time to administer initial and comprehensive exams, cleanings, and panoramic x-rays, as well as fillings and extractions. Finally, counselors and life coaches provide Christian counseling while offering spiritual, emotional, and mental health resources. While all these

are available, the patient gets to decide what they need.

It is this last branch that will be most impacted by the new building and the rooms that it will provide.

"Crossroads Center is our name because we don't just care for physical needs. In 2022, we started our counseling services. We knew that for our patients to truly move toward healing, mental health and counseling had to be addressed. Sometimes people just need some encouragement. We currently have a licensed clinical social worker who helps our patients connect to resources, and we also have a patient liaison who is a life coach. She is a big encourager and recently helped five people gain employment. That really is our goal - keep people working and participating in their lives."

The new expansion will offer rooms with more privacy and soundproofing for counseling sessions as well as spaces to meet and conduct classes for diabetes education, nutrition, and possibly cooking classes.

"We want to equip people to make better choices and



know what to do with what they learn "

Crossroads' efforts not only serve the individual, but Okaloosa and Walton counties as a whole:

- With a more robust and active population, working citizens benefit the economy.
- Ongoing care provided for their patients lessens traffic in emergency rooms.
- When patients without insurance are unable to pay the high cost of medical care, places like Crossroads help keep local healthcare costs down for everyone.



Non-profit organizations like Crossroads Center are invaluable for a flourishing community and mental health is a key component. With the Spiritual Health and Wellness building projected to open by June 2026, the center will continue to be a beacon of hope for years to

provides "Battle Buddies" classes to veterans, consisting of two weeks of academics in a classroom environment followed by four weeks of "public access and familiarity in places like Publix, Kohl's, local restaurants, the Air Force Armament Museum, et cetera," says Executive Director Dennis Krebs.

"We also accomplish specialized training in going through TSA at the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Airport, hospital orientation training at Northwest Florida State College, and going to a movie theater. We take the veterans to places they can experience daily living — to allow them to not just to survive, but to thrive."

The organization was founded in 2015 by a veteran and a group of supporters that understood the benefits a service dog could provide to veterans suffering from PTSD, MST, or TBI. "The idea of rescuing dogs and training them to become service dogs was a win-win situation," says Krebs.

"We save the lives of our veterans and dogs that might otherwise have been euthanized." Healing Paws for Warriors' mantras are "Save a Veteran/Rescue a Dog" and "Saving Lives at Both Ends of the

This fall, Healing Paws for Warriors will continue providing veteran outreach and obtaining applicants for upcoming classes, soliciting for volunteers and fosters, and raising funds to continue supporting the program. "We do not receive any federal of state assistance," says Krebs, "and all of the training and equipment we utilize is provided at no cost to the veterans."

Krebb adds that Tru Plumbing and Gas has "gone above and beyond to support our program, not just by donating, but by helping us solicit potential veteran candidates for our training program. Working with them has been an awesome experience."



A Pastor's Ponderings: Home Field Advantage

This is the time of year when many of us gather around the TV or head to the stadium to watch football or basketball. Whether it's the roar of the crowd in college football's packed stadiums or the excitement of a basketball arena coming alive, one thing is clear: home field advantage is real. When a team has thousands of fans cheering them on, momentum shifts, players push a little harder, and the energy of the crowd has a significant impact.

As a proud Penn State alumnus, my favorite game each year is the "Whiteout" at Beaver Stadium. Over 100,000 fans dressed in white fill the stands, waving towels, chanting in unison, and creating an atmosphere that opponents dread. The electricity is unmatched—a sight to behold. I sometimes imagine what it would look like if Christians showed that same level of excitement and unity about serving the Lord. What if we cheered for Christ with the

same passion that fans cheer for their team? The impact would be eternal.

The Bible paints a similar picture of the Christian life. In Hebrews 12:1, we read: "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." The writer reminds us that we, too, have a kind of "home crowd" advantage. You cannot see them, but surrounding us are the faithful saints who have gone before—Abraham, Moses, David, the apostles, and countless unnamed believers who endured trials and remained faithful.

Like athletes on the field, Christians can become wearry. Life's battles, temptations, and trials sometimes make us feel like we're not winning. But we're not alone. The testimony of those who endured before us encourages us: "Don't give up. Keep going. Stay faithful. The prize is worth it." Their voices remind us that the same God who carried them through will carry us through.

There's also another aspect of this home-field advantage—our encouragement to one another in the present. The crowd in the stands doesn't just come from the past; it comes from today's church family. Just as teammates rally around each other when the game gets tough, we strengthen one another through fellowship, prayer, and shared burdens. A word spoken in love,



a simple prayer lifted up, or even showing up faithfully at church can encourage someone else to keep going.

And most of all, we look to Jesus Himself, the One who secured the victory. Hebrews 12:2 continues: "Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith." No matter how hostile the "away crowd" of this world might feel, the believer knows the outcome—Christ has already won. Our victory is guaranteed because of what He accomplished on the cross.

And while games may leave us biting our nails until the final whistle, our faith rests on a certainty already written. The book of Revelation reveals the outcome—Christ reigns victorious, Satan is defeated, and God's people dwell with Him forever. Unlike a football game, where the result is sometimes uncertain until the last play, our victory is settled from the beginning. That truth should give us courage and confidence, no

matter how fierce the opposition feels today.

So, the next time you watch a game and see the crowd on their feet, cheering loudly for their team, let it be a reminder: we have the home-field advantage, too. Heaven's witnesses are cheering, the church is encouraging, and Christ is leading. Keep running your race. Victory is already ours in Him.

NWFSC Opens New School of Nursing

Ribbon Cutting Marks a Major Milestone for Healthcare Education

On September 4, Northwest Florida State College celebrated a new chapter with the ribbon cutting of its state-of-theart School of Nursing building on the Niceville campus. Community leaders, alumni and supporters joined NWFSC President Mel Ponder and Dean of Health Sciences Dr. Charlotte Kuss for tours of the new 64,000-square-foot facility.

"This expansion is more than bricks and mortar-it's a bold investment in the future of healthcare in our region," said President Mel Ponder. "With over \$34 million dedicated to growing our nursing program, we're doubling enrollment and equipping students with the most advanced technology available."



The project was made possible through \$13 million in state education construction funds and a \$21.8 million Triumph Gulf Coast grant awarded in 2023. Inside the new facility are immersive learning spaces, including virtual reality labs and high-fidelity simulation suites, giving students hands-on training in a safe, real-world environment.

"This new building is a reflection of the incredible caliber and vision that guides our nursing program," said Trustee Chair Rhea Goff. "This will allow our faculty to do even more for students' learning experiences, ensuring they are prepared better than anyone for their field."

NWFSC's nursing program already outperforms state and

national benchmarks. In 2024, the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) program achieved a 98.65% pass rate on the NCLEX-RN exam, compared to Florida's average of 84.1% and the national average of 90.6%. Retention rates are also strong, with 94.3% of students completing the program, far above the statewide average of

With the new facility now open, the college is poised to double nursing enrollment by 2026, helping to meet the growing demand for skilled healthcare professionals across Northwest Florida.


Superintendent Chambers Named FHSAA President
